

USPA Dues are \$12 for the hard core and \$15. for the new members. Each get a magazine and something secure but less tangible in the form of insurance. But what else?

The most important thing of all: your right to jump, to use the air for parachuting. Without the USPA, it is quite doubtful that you would be jumping today and it is a certainty that you wouldn't be tomorrow. The last time various interest groups tried to ban vertical traffic in 1966, the USPA turned out in force. Some of those who testified were Mark Baron and General Stilwell. More poeple turned out for this hearing than any other, except when it was proposed to ban liquor from airlines. The USPA showing was so impressive that after lunch our adversaries didn't even show for the rebuttal. We have been to numerous other F.A.A. hearings on related matters and to countless state hearings. And we'll keep on going.

Parachutists are well organized, persistant and wealthy. Well, not exactly rich but USPA has set aside \$10,000. earmarked "legal fund". And we can get more if need be. Numerous jumpers and Board members are working behind the scenes at local F.A.A. offices, researching obscure publications and making the Washington cocktail circuit to keep us in the air.

In this issue of the SPOTTER, you will read of two new FAA battles. Your national organization has already picked up the banner and is charging forward. When the time comes you will be notified and asked to write a letter or two. 15,000 letters on a couple of desks has been known to change some minds.

And then again, let's not sell the magazine and insurance short. PARACHUTIST provides needed communication; it spreads the word on latest developments to our young and growing sport. Insurance is a great public relations tool and provides a particular service to members in states such as New York and California where insurance is required and expensive to write individually.

And a few cents of every membership goes to the NAA, the FAI, the US Team, to buy telemeters and many other things. Twelve dollars is cheap, very cheap indeed.

GOLDEN EAGLE CRASH SHOCK WAVE HITS PARACHUTING

Due to tremendous congressional pressure, the FAA has acted in record time to prevent another Golden Eagle crash such as the one which killed 31 members of the Wichita State football team in Colorado on 2 October. But it is possible that the proposed rules will overlap into jump operations and would prove so costly as to bring the sport to a standstill. The FAA is acting to provide tighter control over air carriers and apparently has not considered the side affects to other airspace users. Comments on the proposal were due 28 December. USPA wrote asking for an extension of the deadline in order to study the matter in greater detail.

The Board is composed of 12 Conference Directors and ten National directors. Each have equal voting power and the only difference is that the Conference Directors directly represent a geographical area while the National Directors are sort of "ministers without portfolio". The successful candidates will be seated at the next meeting at the end of January. At that time, they will elect the officers of the corporation, the President, Vice-President, Secretary, treasurer and five Executive Committeemen. The President will appoint Committee chairmen who must be approved by the Board and then the chairmen will pick their committees who must be approved by the President. Most of the USPA work is divided up among committees.

MASSACHUSETTS JUMPERS VISIT BOSTON CENTER

The Boston Air Traffic Control center played host to Howard White (ASO), Cesar Aguilar (Pepperell SPC Manager and Council V-P) and Don Grant (Council President) in December. The Center, which is just off the end of the runway at Pepperell, controls all the IFR traffic in New England and eastern New York. A good deal of time was spent with the Gardiner sector controllers and it was noticed that a big "X" marked Orange on the screen; CSPC is in the middle of Vector Two and they have entered into an agreement with ATC to establish a chiminey. It was felt that the visit fostered better relations and a fuller understanding on both sides.

BOSTON ATC MEETING ATTENDED

Conference Director Dan Poynter and Pepperell SPC manager Cesar Aguilar attended the most recent meeting of the Boston Air Traffic Control Advisory Committee on 7 January at Logan Airport. No parachute problems were discussed. Last spring when parachuting was on the agenda, over 20 jumpers representing each DZ and even USPA V-P Len Potts turned up.

FAA BEINGS TO SHARPEN SWORD AGAIN

Proposal would curtail jumping

FAM is about to publish a "Notice of Proposed Rule Making" with the purpose of dealing a death blow to parachuting according to informed sources. Under present rules, jumpers must inform FAM as to when and where they are jumping but under the proposal, FAM would tell the jumpers when and where; they would set up certain columns of air as they pleased.

Reports are confusing as to the origin of the proposal, it is either related to Jacques Istel's chiminey request or it may have come from the Chicago FAA which allegedly has had trouble with jumpers on the approach to O'Hare.

This information is unusual because the notice has yet to be published; it was uncovered by a couple of USPA directors doing some super sleuthing.

The Notice will be published in the next few weeks and information as to the proper course of action will be well publicized in these pages, ASO bulletins and PARACHUTIST Magazine. It will be of the utmost importants that every parachutist write at least one letter.

In the mean time, Bill Ottley has scheduled meetings with several people in the FAA and will attempt to block the Proposal before it gets into print.

The last time USPA turned out to defend jumpers was in 1966. Parachutists provided the greatest turnout for any hearing since it was proposed to ban liquor from the airlines.

FATALITY REPORTS

Printed below is a list of recent parachuting fatalities. These reports are printed in the SPOTTER for instructional purposes. These are not just "jump stories"; they are reports of real people and it is felt that this produces a greater impression upon the reader. Learn from the problems encountered by others--read and carefully analyze each fatality report.

***Date: 17 October 1970 Name: David A. Burch Place Ft. Bragg, N. C.

Age: 20

Jumps: 13 Mil S/1, 6 Sport s/1

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft on his first jump and pull and had a hard pull or experienced difficulty in locating the main ripcord. He lost control and began clawing at the reserve, pulling the wires to the Sentinel and unplugging it. He activated the reserve at less than 100 feet and died on impact. ***Date: 18 October 1970 Name: Joseph G. Turner Place: Denver, Colorado

Age: 27 Jumps: 278

Cause of death: Deceased was making a 30 second demo into a football field with a Delta II Para Wing. He over shot the grass slightly and crossed the track to land on a concrete curb. His feet slipped and he sat down hard on the curb. He died a few minutes later. The wing functioned normally. Deceased had a past history of medical problems, was 5' tall and weighed 100 lbs but his doctor had OKed his jumping. An autopsy revealed a 15% carbon monoxide level in his blood. The jump had been from 13,200 feet and the CO may have impared judgement, and resulting admin or gother action and are broken

***Date: 25 October 1970

Name: Darlene Alban
Place: Millican, Brazos, Texas

Age: 20 Jumps: 31

Cause of death: Deceased was last out of a Beech on an intended sixty; she was to work on tracking and delta positions. She pulled at about 100 feet and died on impact. She had suffered from dizzy spells and was advised to consult a doctor; she did and secured a class III medical.

***Date: 1 November 1970 Name: Charles A. Morito Place: Franklin, Wisconsin

Age: 23

Jumps: First Cause of death: Deceased made a weak exit and went backwards. The pack opened and the pilot chute assist separated and the sleeve began to horseshoe. The pilot chute entangled in the lines and the canopy did not come out of the sleeve. He activated the reserve at about 100-150 feet and it tangled with the main.

***Date: 1 November 1970
Name: A. Jusz

Place: Sparta, Wisconsin

Age: 22 Jumps: 22

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft at 2500 feet for a planned jump and pull in an accuracy meet. He pulled and the pilot chute looped around the lines just below the skirt; the sleeve came off but one third of the canopy. He activated his reserve and it entangled with the main. It began to inflate at about 40 feet. He died on impact.

***Date: 15 November 1970
Name: Steven Hansen Murray
Place: Taft, California

Jumps: First

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft and rolled causing the sleeved main to wrap around his body. The pull of the pilot chute began to unwrap him and then four or five lines looped around the sleeve about 6 feet from the top. He deployed his reserve too low and died on impact.

***Date: 15 November 1970 Name: Fred J. Bottini.
Place: Wisconsin
Age: 26

Jumps: 48

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft on a planned relative work jump. All went as planned until pull time and then he appeared to be buffeting until impact. An inspection of the equipment resulted in the following theory: Deceased was unable to pull his main, a 3 pin, crossbow piggy back, which may have been caused by the cable stop or bent stiffener panel (he had difficulty getting turned around in the aircraft and on exit). He removed his gloves, activated his riser releases and waited for the static line to work. attempt was made to activate the reserve. He died on impact.

CORRECTION:

Last issue, it was reported in this column that Sam Williams died when his Para Plane failed to come out of the deployment bag. A later investigation by the ASO revealed that the deceased was in the habit of pulling his main ripcord quickly and in a downwards manner. He probably hooked out his reserve as he did so since it began to deploy and entangled with the reefing system of the Para Plane. The conical inverted and the main stayed within the deployment bag. He died on impact.

PROPOSED B.S.R. AMENDMENTS FOR SOUTH EAST ASIA JUMPING By Lynn Rice (stolen from "The Sharp-Chuter)

As you are well aware, USPA doctrine on student training is used by our club as a guideline for all student training. However, in all fairness to the student jumper as well as the experienced jumpers, I believe it has become necessary for the club training committee and our safety officers to create a recommended training outline for use specifically by the clubs in Southeast Asia. This guideline will not change any existing procedures but provide augmentation and may be used for the same conditions for any club in the future that is faced with the same situation.

There are certain hazards in S.E.A. that are not covered by any present parachuting directives. Listed below are a few recommendations that should be included in a student's prejump training:

- 1. Landings: All normal landing procedures (PLF, water, tree, etc) should be taught but provisions made for mine field and down-wind landings into VC hamlets. Briefings on how to field pack in a mine field would be most helpful. A quickie course in Vietnamese to include, but not limited to, such phrases as: Jumpmaster; Don't touch my rig; friend; the lst Cav is watching me; etc.
- 2. Helicopter Extraction: Helicopter extraction procedures should be given at this point in training. Also included should be hints on how to coax the pilot into coming in after you. (Unpunched monthly beer ration cards are usually helpful). It also should be noted that these procedures will vary from time to time.
- 3. Exit: a. Normal exit procedures for both student and experienced jumpers should be used. However, experienced jumpers should be made aware of the possible reporcussions that could befall, them from directing obscene gestures to nervous, hungover doorgunners as they exit. b. Jumpmasters should be made aware that on slicks and C-119's there is no need to tell the pilot to lock his wheels.
- 4. General Procedures: a. It is recommended that an all Volunteer crew fly the jump aircraft and that they be well rewarded at the end of the day (a few cardinal demo's will suffice). This is especially true for nervous doorgunners and shadow pilots.
- 5. Drop Zone: a. All normal communication equipment should be available. Helpful aids should include an armored personnel carrier for DZ-to-airfield transportation. The ground crew should consist of atleast one experienced Jumpmaster and a team of Green Berets to assist in setting up the DZ, helping students field pack, maintaining club jump logs, etc. b. Smoke should be in constant use from jump run to landing, especially if the pilot is dustoff. c. To augment the target analysis, 3 red panels should be laid out and visable from exit altitude; if after exit these panels are removed, all jumpers should clear the air immediately. This is normally given in case of ground or rocket attact on the DZ. The ground crew should be briefed on DZ defense. d. If a "P" gravel target is used it should be checked before each day's jumping for punji stakes, trip wires, frag devices, etc.
- 6. Special Training: a. Recommend all RW jumpers successfully complete a course on escape and evasion during their 12 month period in-country and prior to their first VN jump.

NOTICE TO SNOWMOBILE DRIVERS: Lake Plaicd has set up ten town roads for snow-mobiles. There have been many fatalities in upper NY this year. So far this season, there have been 60 in Canada with six in Ontatio in just one day. One guy ran into a train near Termers Falls, Mass. It is obviously safer to be up in the air away from all those hazards.

FOUR KILLED IN MISSOULA MID-AIR

All but one occupant of a Cessna 180 jump aircraft were killed when struck by an Air Coup while climbing for altitude. The incident occurred on 1 November five miles east of Missoula at about 5000 feet with the Air Coup descending and striking the 180 from the front in the left wing just a foot or so from the fusilage. The Prop went into the Cabin of the 180. Jim Ledbetter was thrown out on impact and his parachute opened by itself. Judy Barrett's parachute also opened but it was damaged and it is theorized that she was dead for the entire canopy ride. Killed were Marcia Kontorowitz of Chicago with 150 jumps, William LeFluer of Great Falls with 170 jumps, Judy Barrett of Great Falls with 15 jumps and the pilot Bob Lueck. The Air Coup pilot was Clayton Lesley of Avery, Idaho.

> SHARP-CHUTERS HOLD FIRST MEET By Zach Watson (stolen from The Sharp-Chuter)

The Sharp-Chuters Sports Parachute Club recently held the first International Southeast Asia Sport Parachuting Competition Meet near Saigon. It was a rather unique happening and there were some minor and unique problems encountered. Among these were assorted air traffic over the jump area consisting of Boeing 347's, 707's, 727's, 747's, DC-8's, DC-9's, DC-10's, C5A's, C141's, C133, C121, Cl30, Cl24, Cl23, Cl19, C47, C7A, Twin Beech, Huey slicks, Cobra gunships, LOH's, Otters, Beavers, F4, F100, F101, F104, F105, F5A, A37, AIE, B52, B57, OIE, OV2, OV10. and a Bleriot from an old french rubber plantation. It was just as well that we didn't have a jump ship as we couldn't get air clearance above 500 feet or below 93,000 feet. There were however, only a few VC on the DZ and the AA fire was light. It was a good thing no one showed up anyway, the beer truck had broken down enroute and we maintained our untouchable safety record because nobody jumped our chutes that had rotted since the Next issue: The Award Ceremony. THE EQUIPMENT CORNER

The Equipment Corner is a regular feature of the SPOTTER designed to convey industry news to the reader. Manufacturers and suppliers are encouraged to submit material.

GENERAL:

Government cutbacks in spending and controls on the economy have put numerous sport parachutists out of work but the sport parachute industry has not been adversely affected. Perhaps the jumpers have less money but more time to jump. Several surplus items are in very short supply: pilot chutes, 26' conicals and adjustable quick ejector snaps, all highly desirable items. The one day rail strike gave the industry a good idea as to what will happen if a long one comes along after the "cooling off period". The Post Office, UFS and everyone else ships by rail when the packages go over a couple of hundred miles. Long shipments will have to go by air and the facilities here will soon be jammed.

PIONEER RECOVERY SYSTEMS, Manchester, Conn.
The two color jumpsuits went well and a batch of black and red are being manufactured. They will feature new heavy duty nylon zippers. The familiar light blue jumpsuit will be replaced by a darker color blue. Latest product is a \$49.50 instant uniform for off-duty policemen. A two zip with lots of pockets for Mace, whistle, etc. An improved reefing line and a replacement spring for the plunger has been supplied all Volplane owners and a new manual is now available. The Psychedelic PC will be available for \$35. more; the black, gold, pink and orange taffeta has been printed in a camouflage pattern. Some solid color PCs have also been made. The harness and container line is being switched over from sage green to a dark blue color. Net sales for the third quarter were down but net income was up.

PARA-PLANE SCHOOL DRAWS TOP COMPETITORS

Over the Christmas holidays, Steve Snyder ran a Para-Plane training session for top accuracy men in Barnwell, South Carolina. Some 300 jumps were made by Tom Schapanski, Dave Sauve, Don Rice, Bobby Frierson, Gene Paul Thacker, Woody Binnecker, Jim Smith, Bob Branch and Mac McCraw. Frierson averaged 13 cm on one string of 16 jumps. The purpose of the training session was to bring together men who had established themselves as accopmlished accuracy jumpers and to school them on the most recently learned techniques in handling the new canopy. Steve Snyder and Dick Morgan have developed the "PAL" system of control which involves an up wind step approach. It should be recalled that a lot of jumpers were trying to pass a baton and then Snyder and Charlie Hilliard got together in 1959, from then on it was easy and everyone did it. "it is simply a case of finding out through trial and error just how to do something and then once figuring it out, passing the information on to others", said Snyder. The School in Barnwell concentrated on approaches, handling upwinders and operating limitations. From Barnwell, the group journeyed south to Pop's meet in Florida where the Fara-Plane team of Schapanski, Friesson, Snyder and Morgan took first place against some of the country's best accuracy jumpers. Para-planes also gave PCs a run for their money in the individual accuracy event. Competitors were heard to say that shooting upwinders was easier on the body while the judges commented that upwinders were easier and more accurately judged due to the slower closing speed. Roy Johnson made a dead center on his first jump on the Para-Plane. The Para-Plane combines slow rate of descent with high forward speed and a shallow glide angle, It is a rectangular, double surfaced high performance parachute.
