TAHLEQUAH TO BE SITE OF '71 NATIONALS

Once again. Tahlequah. Oklahoma will be the site of the National Parachuting Championships. The bid from Norm Heaton's home town was \$11,675, Marana, Arizona bid \$14,625, Clarinda, Iowa was over \$18,000 and Galveston was over \$25,000. Following previous nationals at Tahlequah in 1966 and 1967, three of the more popular bars were blown up but Norm Heaton assured the Board that adequate facilities have been restored. The event is scheduled for 19-27 June and will run up to dark on Sunday night if necessary. Chief Judge Bob Sprague will try to run all three events simultaneously by setting up two separate drop areas on the airport.

The "car pool grapevine" over at the FAA reports that the controversial proposal 70-41 (which would require just about everybody who carried jumpers or anything else for hire to maintain and operate their aixplanes in accordance with the super-high standards required of air taxics and airlines) is now just about a dead issue. A strictly unofficial report says the FAA now is trying to decide whether to withdraw the whole thing, or amend it "out of sight", so it won't begin to trouble us. Apparently there are some embarrassed people over there, who admit that it was drafted too quickly in response to public and Congressional pressure to "do something" about the Wichita football team crash. We're also told that FAA was "amazed" by the response from jumpers and jump plane owners. Our response joins negative letters received from the Business Aircraft Association, AOPA, the National Pilots Association, and just about everybody else. NATIONALS ENTRANCE REQUIREMENTS ALTERED

The USPA Board changed the Nationals qualification requirements for the 1972 season. USPA Part 50 was amended to allow each conference to send 8 men and 8 women or 1% of the conference, whichever is greater. The count is to be taken on 31 December of the previous year. This should mean about ten will be sent from the Northeast as the membership is around 1000. Each delegate to the Nationals must turn at least one series in the conference meet with a time of 12 seconds corrected. Each conference delegation will consist of the first 2 in accuracy, the first 2 in style and the rest from the overall positions. The 3.2 meter rule was removed after a scorching editorial in this publication and a three page plea from Conference Director, Dan Poynter.

Each conference will be allowed one relative work team, but others may qualify by performing all maneuvers at the conference meet in 25 seconds or less. The team maneuvers were changed and new revised rules have been forwarded to the Northeast team, the Frontier Skydivers of Buffalo. Other teams should write

Monterey for a copy of Part 51.

COMPUTERIZED SCORING SLATED FOR PACIFIC CONFERENCE MEET/NATIONALS

Gary Patmor, Chairman of USPA's Research and Development Committee, has been working with J. J. Williams and D. P. Dudley to computerize the scoring of parachute meets. The system would minimize errors and would expedite the computation and reporting of scores and standings. The system selected is the General Electric Mark II Time Sharing Service using a portable teletype terminal; it offers on-line data processing seven days a week and may be accessed from remote locations through a conventional telephone line. A standard feature of this terminal is a paper tape punch that will permit scores to be typed and checked without the telephone connection to a computer. Once scores are punched and verified, a telephone connection is established and actual data transmission is accomplished by using an integral paper tape reader, thereby minimizing telephone and computer connect time costs. Cutput is printed directly at the terminal.

Only minor changes are required in judging, recording and scoring and the number of personnel in the scoring section will be reduced. The system will be tested at the Pacific Conference Meet and if proven successful, will be used at the Nationals in Tahlequah in June. After a scoring mix-up last year, the USPA Board voted to use twin scoring teams in the future. The computer would eliminate this require-

ment.

FINDING CHILL FACTOR NO MYSTERY! Stolen from Pioneer Valley Newsletter

O K, all you mysteries-of-the-meteorologist fans, here it is - the secret formula for determining the chill factor, or how cold you REALLY are when the wind is blowing and the bottom is about to fall out of the thermometer. According to State Climatologist Robert F. Lautzenhieser, computation of the chill factor is a very simple (heh, heh) matter:

Take the square root of the wind speed in meters per second times 100 plus 10.45 minus the wind speed in meters per second and multiply that times 33 minus the air temperature in Selsius (formerly centigrade) degrees.

The answer is the chill factor in terms of kilogram calories per square meter per hour. GOTCHA:

JUMPING IN THAILAND BY Paul Lemieux

In Thailand, jumps come hard but are not impossible to get; in fact things might be picking up in the next few years. There are presently three main sources of jump A/C:

The Metrapab program, which runs from January through June each year. These are usually weekend jumps made from a C-123, being joint Thai-American jumps, mixed military static line, and freefall, the last pass is usually from 7200 for the better Thai and American F F's.

FAA PROHIBITS STADIUM JUMPS by Bill Ottley

James F. Rudolph, Director of Flight Standards Service of the F.A.A. sent the following directive to all G.A.D.O.s on 21 December.

"Until further notice waivers of FAR 105.15 will not be issued to authorize parachute jumps into bowl-type stadiums; or other open air assemblies of persons unloss the area approaching the landing target is free of persons and is not over an occupied parking lot or uncontrolled vehicular traffic. Further, the sponsor of the exhibition or local political subdivision as appropriate must ensure that adequate crowd centrol personnel will be provided to keep the approach and landing areas clear."

This is apparently the result of Gil Wieland's perfectly legal jump into D.C.'s J.F.K. Stadium on 20 December when he landed on the 50 yd. line. But George Moore, FAA Associate Administrator for operations was in the stands. (Moore is known as "the airlines' man" within FAA, utterly opposed to general aviation in all forms and certainly totally opposed to sporting aviation or activities in all forms.) Moore went through the roof, demanded that the pilot (apparently the chief test pilot for Fairchild-Hiller, who supplied the helicopter used for the jump) be charged with a violation and that, figuratively speaking, everybody be lined up and shot.

Except that Mr. Wieland had obeyed every rule! He had received a waiver from some very low-level FAA man at the Washington District Office, and had "demonstrated his proficiency" by making an exactly similar jump two weeks earlier from the same helicopter into the same stadium, empty! (This is apparently the new FAA way of deciding who can make jumps and who can't — if you can do it once in front of an FAA man, you can do it any time anywhere.)

KALTHOFF HITS 1000 won't borrow equipment again

PETER KALTHOFF wanted to do something different on jump # 1000 so he borrowed a Stylemaster from Steve Gwin. But Steve had used green tape to make line stows and slipped in a 28' flat. In freefall, they passed a bottle of champagne with his wings taped to the side. At 2500', Peter dumped and came to an abrupt stop as the unsleeved, unmodified flat circular was introduced to the air stream. His head went one way and the bottle and wings another. Upon surveying the situation: the unstable canopy above and the high winds below, he calmly withdrew the large hunting knife from its sheath on the reserve and made a four line cut. On returning the knife, he slipped and pierced the reserve slicing 14 panels of Steve's new Security steerable. Lotsa fun over Livermore.

FATALITY REPORTS

Printed below is a list of recent parachuting fatalities. These reports are printed in the SPOTTER for instructional purposes. These are not just "jump stories"; they are reports of real people and it is felt that this produces a greater impression upon the reader. Learn from the problems encountered by others - read and carefully analyze each fatality report.

***Date: 29 November 1970

Name: Tony Fredin

Place: Zephyrhills, Florida

Age: 26

Jumps: 500+

Cause of death: Deceased and two others left the aircraft at 5200 feet on a three man attempt at about 3:00 am. Deceased pulled too low and died on impact. Drugs and alcohol are suspected. This incident had nothing to do with the normal parachute operation at this DZ as a rental aircraft from Texas was used and the center personnel were not on site.

***Date: 20 December 1970
Name: James Frank Malovrh
Place: Apollo, Pennsylvania

Age: 23

Jumps: 9 (3 ff)

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft on a planned 3 second delay. He rolled slightly at pull and the pilot chute caught on his leg causing a horse-shoe. The pilot chute released and tangled with the sleeve. The reserve could be observed at about 400° and was not quite inflated at impact. Malovrh died 3 hours later. The Sentinel was not fired but checked out. Deceased may have pulled the reserve above 1000 feet and been slow in aiding deployment (he was descending rapidly) or he may have pulled the wires loose above 1000°.

Jumps: 10 (1st ff)

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft at 3200' on her first freefall.

After 3 seconds, she pulled the main ripcord from the pocket but made no apparent attempt to pull any further or reach for the reserve. She fell stable and died on impact. Only 16 lbs was required to open the reserve.

Name: Frank Gerald Karvia Place: Lakeside, California

Age: 27 Jumps: 14

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft at 5400' on his first 15 second delay. He began to turn and was in a flat spin at pull time. Then he went completely out of control and apparently tried to correct the difficulty losing track of time. He pulled at 150-200' and died on impact.

YOU READ IT IN THE SPOTTER

***Date: 9 January 1971

David Isaiah Fogleman Name: Place: Elsinore, California

Age: 19

Jumps: 250 est

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft at 3200' on a planned 6-10 second delay with a Para Plane. On opening, the pilot chutes appeared to be hooked over the leading edge, closing off a couple of the cells slightly thus causing a higher though not critical rate of descent. He made turns which shifted the pilot chutes but did not cause the canopy to fully inflate. At 500-800' he elected to breakaway and his reserve streamered with one side of the canopy slightly higher than the other. Some witnesses felt the canopy was beginning to open as he impacted.

STEVENS PARA-LOFT, Cakland Airport, California has just begun production of a unique jumpsuit. The double zippered model has deep armholes and a combination knit and velcro secured cuff; the result is a significant increase in area during flaring. It has two velcro closed pockets, one over the heart and the other on the right shoulder. The stirrups are nylon webbing and will wear longer. The most unusual feature is the knee pads of machine washable color coordinated leather there is a pocket in the inside for foam pads if desired. Solid colors: black, red and green will be run first. Prices are not yet announced.

PARACHUTES, INCORPORATED, Orange, Mass. may use special MK-II like Para-Commanders for all students at their two centers in '72 or '73. The canopies would be fitted with toggle stops to prevent fast turns and stalls, heavy duty crown lines and a lobster tail design to enable the ground crew to determine flight direction. Two proto types have been made.

CSPC opens on 3 April. Bill Hammel is returning to PI, and will manage the Lakewood center.

The new (old) blue, pebbled cover 150 jump log book is back and will cost \$2.75. A new 550 jump, updated model is due in April.

SECURITY PARACHUTE CO., San Leandro, Calif.: the big news here is the Thunderbow, an apex forward triangle with center lines and an area equal to a 23'-24' flat circular. It is said to be 3 lbs lighter than a PC and be composed of fewer parts; it has 20 lines. The aim is to increase the sink of the prototype without going into a stall. Mid-March is set as a marketing date. Security will supply the "Peanut Butter and Jelly Sandwich" Relative Work Team with Thunderbows to use at the Nationals. Also getting attention is the convertable piggyback Crossbow system; improvements are expected shortly. The chair chute designed for Sailplanes is selling well.

CHUTE SHOP, Box 445, Flemington, NJ. The Mini-System will soon be available in colors. John Higgins is touring the country and made the round of Northern California DZs during the Board meeting in Monterey. The Northstar altimeter has been increased in price by \$2. to \$44.95.

WARD VENE ORIGINALS. Terry Ward and Frank Venegas have discontinued business and with it the ever popular Flightmaster custom jumpsuit.

STRONG ENTERPRISES, INC., 542 East Squantum St., North Quincy, Mass. has a number of interesting products to mention such as the engraved, chromed Capewell release covers for \$19 a pair, a uniquely designed set of heavy duty crown lines for the Para-Commander, center pull reserve conversion for \$12 which includes the handle (yes, that's the new center pull conversion) and a new line of drag chutes. The Stylemaster is now available in color combinations o of solid black, black and red, black and gold, or black and white. The sage green is also still available. The rigging school has been very active and several foreign students have attended.

HI_TEK Corp, Santa Ana, Calif: The model 8000 parachute opener is nearing the production stage. Gary Patmor, Chairman of the USPA R & D Committee has prepared an eleven page evaluation report on the device. Copies from Monterey.

PICNEER RECOVERY SYSTEMS, Manchester, Conn. The new psychadelic PC's are a pound heavier and are more difficult to fit into the container. Psych I pattern of orange, pink, gold and black camouflage is sold out but 50 of the 75 Psych II pattern of red, black and gold with black arms are left. There will be five solid colors: (black, red, gold, light blue and white) and 2 multi patterns in '71: a challenger (red, white and blue) but with rad stabilizers and a new pattern called the "Invader", a red, black and gold combination which is very attractive. Three Mark II patterns will be retained: the Aztec, Sunburst and the red, white and blue pattern.

The following advice is from Bill Hardman, owner-manager of Paranaut Enterprises. Abbotsford, B.C., for anyone encountering difficulties with local farmers in the area of their drop zone:

1. Make all farmers aware of the U.S.P.A. PL/PD insurance.

2. Use paper weights on your "wind drift indicators" so they will disintegrate over time, and the wires will not be a hazard to livestock.

3. Use "cable stops" on all ripcords so that lost ripcords will not pose a hazard

to farm equipment and livestock.

4. Educate all your jumpers on the care of farmers equipment, crops and fences. Apologise whenever feasible to the landowner involved when a member inadvertently lands on his property.

5. On occasions when the farmers in the area require assistance, a few of the

jumpers could pitch in and give voluntary help.

6. Complimentary observation rides in the aircraft, free aerial photos of the farmer's buildings, etc., could all add up to a very pleasant and workable situation with your neighbours.

I'm sure it would be worth the effort of setting up a program like this and getting together with your neighbors to advise them of what you're doing, and are willing to do.
