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

#### HE WHO HAS A CHOICE COMPLAINS LESS

At the Nationals each year, USPA charges each competitor a set fee (usually \$100) for the complete jump-room-board package. Housing and food have been steadily improving over the years but there will always be complaints. If one doesn't get enough towels, can't get a room with his wife, arrived for dinner when the dessert was gone or found his steak too rare, he complains to the housing director. The real problem can often be traced to a slow style time or a bad reach; competitors can become pretty irritable.

On the other hand, if all 200 competitors had to find their own meals and housing, chaos would develop as they all descend on a small town the day before the meet; individual prices would be much higher. It has worked at the collegiate meet and the result has saved USPA a lot of money. But then, this meet is just 3 days and college students will forego the luxuries to save money. Tahlequah has numerous hotels and several good eating spots but the end of June is the start of the tourist season.

The best alternative may be to give everyone a choice. For example: \$100 on the jump-room-board plan or \$50. for the jumps only plan - find your own place. He who has a choice complains less.

UNPROTECTED RIPCORDS: Three jumpers have gone through the sides of aircraft since the first of the year. Six suffered similarly last year. This is a tremendous increase over the usual one per year. Protect that handle at all times. If the reserve begins to open in the aircraft, follow it out regardless of altitude (you're going anyway).

It consisted of a sport parachutist (dummy) in full gear hanging under a suspended Para-Commander. The editorial staff wished Strong well for winning the "Osaka Tumae" and strangely enough, few readers caught the joke. Anyway, the display was real and when the exposition was over, Ron Smith (D-2133, SCR 176 and ASO PA/18) who is stationed in Japan, purchased the gear. The jumpsuit was a Sky King model and in fairly good shape, if dusty. The helmet and boots would be all right if they fit. The Stylemaster harness and container system seemed OK and that is why he bid on the entire set, but the reserve was filled with foam rubber. The wrist mount was very nice and sported a new seven jewel Hanhart watch but the Altimaster II was another story. It had been supplied by Steve Snyder without the inner works and the needle always points to zero. The Mark II canopy had a lot of tape sewn to it to enclose steel rods to give it shape and more than six feet of the lines had been chopped off so that the open canopy and jumper could be suspended under the 25' of ceiling space alloted. Smith writes that Mark IIswith 6 feet of line cut off don't drive very well.

# PAN AM GIRL MAKES GOOD IN SHIRT TEST From SKI Magazine

Some of it is picked up by other parachutists, but most is taken by others in jump shack burglaries and thefts from automobiles. 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#### FATALITY REPORTS

Printed below is a list of recent parachuting fatalities. These reports are printed in the SPOTTER for instructional purposes. These are not just "jump stories"; they are reports of real people and it is felt that this produces a greater impression upon the reader. Learn from the problems encountered by others - read and carefully analyze each fatality report.

\*\*\*\*Date: 6 December 1970

Name:

Place: Rickingham, WA. Australia

Age:

Jumps: First freefall

Cause of death: Deceased was making his first freefall and being unable to activate the main, he pulled the reserve but was tumbling and became entangled in it. The reserve cleared and began to deploy just before impact.

\*\*\*\*Date: 28 January 71

Name: Arthur G. Anderson

Place: Wamego Airport, Pottawotomie Co., Kansas

Age: 19
Jumps: 7

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft at 3200 feet on his first freefall. He appeared to reach in for the pull, started to roll to the right, spread back out and fell fairly stably until impact. The Sentinel may not have been armed.

\*\*\*\*Date: 31 January 1971

Name: Ruth Kathleen Davis Place: Brownfield, Texas

Age: 20 Jumps: 9

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft at 3500 feet on her third freefall, a five second dealy. She remained on heading for about 10 seconds and then began to turn to the left slowly. She made no apparent attempt to pull either ripcord and died on impact. The Sentinel failed to operate according to reports.

\*\*\*\*Date: 7 February 1971
Name: Lawrence W. Genet
Place: Coolidge, Arizona

Age: Approx 19 years

Jumps: 16

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft on a planned five second delay, reached in for the ripcord and tugged lightly. He remained tugging and stable and pulled his reserve about 60'. He had been thoroughly pin checked and it appears that he simply did not pull hard enough. He was a product of Poppenhager's freefall first jump training and therefore all 16 jumps were freefalls.

\*\*\*\*Date: 28 February 1971 Name: Terry V. Garrett

Place: Edgewater, Maryland

Age: 24 Jumps: 379

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft at 7200 feet on a four man relative attempt. About ten seconds after opening, the deceased came in behind the low man and passed through his lines above his head. Both canopies became entangled and decreased slid down, around and to the right of the other jumper. The other jumper's arms were immobilized by the lines. After some discussion,

the deceased cut away and opened his reserve at about 1500 feet. He landed in the water about 15 yards from shore and drowned. The water was 35 degrees and his breathing passages may have been blocked by mud.

\*\*\*\*Date: 6 March 1971
Name: Walter Nielson

Place: Pepperell, Massachusetts

Age: 22 Jumps: First

Cause of death: The top pin of the static line bent and broke in a splintering manner and the broken off end scissored back down on the elastic loop cone, securing the top of the container closed. The velcro pilot chute assist system separated without moving the pilot chute which remained trapped in the container or hemitated until impact. No attempt was made to activate the reserve which, when tested, took less than 10 pounds to open. The reserve handle was positioned bend outward for winter use. Deceased landed in snow some distance from the airport and suffered only a broken leg and a broken jaw; he died of suffocation.

\*\*\*\*Date: 14 March 71

Name: Frank J. Stefan Place: Alliance. Ohio

Age: 27 Jumps: 109

Cause of death: Deceased made a clear and pull from 5500 feet on an experimental wing. He appeared to have some difficulty with the steering and cut it away at about 2000 feet. He drifted out into the freezing cold water. He activated his flotation gear and was seen to remain active for about four minutes but his head went under before the boat could reach him.

\*\*\*\*Date: 28 March 1971
Name: Larry L. Carver
Place: Birchwood, Alaska

Age: 21 Jumps: 37

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft at 7500 feet on a relative work jump. At about 1800 feet, he appeared to reach in with his right hand and then went out of control. He stabled at 300 feet, used a two handed pull and activated the main. He died on impact. The deceased had a cold and had taken Contac.

\*\*\*\*Date: 4 April 1971 Name: Bonnie Pike

Place: Bruchsal, West Germany

Age: 25 Jumps: First

Cause of death: Deceased left the aircraft, the pack opened and the assembly pulled out but the sleeve did not come off. She made no apparent attempt to pull the reserve and died on impact. Deceased had packed her own parachute under supervision. The sleeve used string ties to secure the line cover flap and she had tied one string around the lines.

Note: Fred Kunzendorff died in South Africa. No details are known.

#### SKYLINE AND COMPANY

Tom Cordero and the former employees of Ward-Vene Originals have reorganized to continue production of the famous jumpsuit. The "Starmaster" will start at \$30. for one color models and go to \$40.+ for custom patterns.

#### PARACHUTES INCORPORATED.

The first jump course is back to \$45 after a disappointing year at \$55. The centers are now supplying the jumpmasters with specially designed Pioneer jumpsuits with Velcro'ed name tags to simplify the issue.

Over 1800 Para-Commanders were manufactured during 1970. The Volplane is being witheld from the market until the hydralic reefing device is improved; estimated time is two months. The new heavy duty system will be supplied to current Volplane owners at no charge. In the meantime, delays of five seconds of less are recommended. The Startrack jumpsuits will be featured in full color in an ad in the May issue of PARACHUTIST. The ever popular three pin container has been shortened five inches and is available in sage green and navy blue. Sales for Pioneer and its subsidiaries fell \$11 million to \$33,000,000 from 1969 reflecting the general decline in US business and the reduction in government spending. Pioneer recently received a major subcontract from North American Rockwell to develop the crew escape system for the Air Force's new B-1 Strategic Bomber. The crew compartment of the B-1 will separate from the rest of the aircraft in an emergency and use a recovery system similar to the one used for the Apollo command module. The Pioneer system will use a mortar-deployed parachute to stabilize the crew compartment after it is ejected from the bomber. Three small pilot chutes are then rocket deployed. These small parachutes, in turn, deploy the three main

parachutes. Pioneer is scheduled to deliver the first preproduction test para-

chute next May, 1972.

The latest new product from Strong is a jumpsuit; heavy duty with a lot of new features, it is due to hit the market about 15 June. The military water wing shape LPU is available packed in a new compact case with a velcro pull tab. The case is available in black or sage green. The unit is priced at \$8.95.

Para-Commander rebuilding and retrimming has increased. Crown lines are being retensioned and rebuilt so that they won't shift again for \$4.50. New control lines are \$9.50 installed; this design allows better response, no tensioning is required and the lines won't wear out. Lines may be shortened for \$19.50 or retentioned.

#### STEVE SNYDER ENTERPRISES.

SSE has the rights to the Olympic canopy and will manufacture it in the US. The Olympic is the French version of the Para-Commander. The latest design is the advanced super Olympic designated "Papillon" which means butterfly. It has a non-porous fabric.

Tests are currently being made on a shortlined Para-Plane. The Sentinel 2000 is scheduled to hit the market on 1 May. A single point breakaway release is being developed; just pull the reserve and the canopy releases are automatically activated.

STEVENS PARALOFT reports that inquiries on the Stevens Cutaway Stytem have been received from 122 areas. It has been used at least 22 times in the last  $2\frac{1}{2}$  years.

#### CAPACITY CROWD ATTENDS REUNION AT PLAYBOY CLUB

All 165 tickets were sold out a week in advance and scores were turned away from the Council banquet and parachuting reunion held at the Playboy Club in Boston on 16 April. The guest list read like the parachuting social register reflecting D numbers such as: 1, 3, 10, 16, 26, 49, 66, 160, 175, 213, 231, 241, 334, 454, and 556 and C's such as 469, 622 and 736 and, of course, Don Strathy's B-184. All parts of the country, and then some, were represented: Frank Binford from California, Ed O'Brien and Barbara Bussell from the Virgin Islands, Dave Coxall (CSPA Director) from New Brunswick, Carter Twedt from Nevada, Ed Dorey from Wisconsin, Mike Lyon from N J to name a few. The buffet dinner was followed with a brief council meeting and some awards. Don Dupont received his Gold Wings from Conference Director Dan Poynter. Next, Council President Don Grant was presented with a USPA Certificate of Appreciation for "fathering" the Instructor Certification Course program for the USPA.

Carl Boenish's outstanding film MASTERS OF THE SKY was shown to an excited audience; many of the old timers had only heard of the big star work and the film was

a great introduction.

The whole evening was well received and went extremely smoothly. Another is in the planning stages for next year and it will probably be held at a larger place, perhaps a country club.

The banquet committee was composed of Marge Bates, Irene Gorham, Bill Hamilton, Condon McDonough, Dan Poynter, Dana Smith, Myrt Strong, Andy Simon and Howard White.

#### PEPPERELL TWIN OTTER A HUGE SUCCESS

On 17 April the Twin Otter, piloted by Mark Schmidt (D=21), Bill Viets and Phil Bedeau, made 17 flights of 16 jumpers each to 15,000 feet over Pepperell, Mass. Only one eightman was made but a lot was learned. Over a hundred jumpers came from as far as California and Ottawa to take part in the quick 15 minute flights. Saturday evening saw over 250 turn out for the dinner and film festival. Carl Boenish's MASTERS OF THE SKY highlighted the evening. Several other films were shown including Kevin Brady's on malfunctions and the crash of the F-14. Ray Finneran showed his super eight "X" rated jump cartoon.

The Twin Otter will return to Pepperell on the three day Memorial Day weekend and the three day weekend of July Fourth as well as on 7 & 8 August and 18 & 19 Sept. A number of clubs are reportedly forming star teams. Evening festivities for these dates are being planned. Kevin Brady has measured the Otter for his camera.

#### DUTCH TEAM TO VISIT ST THOMAS

The Dutch men and womens exhibition team will be guests of the St Thomas and Burnaby Parachute Clubs on 24 May at the Tillsonburg, Ontario DZ. Saturday morning will see a fun meet scheduled in their honor with sack races, egg passes and so on. A big party is scheduled for Saturday Evening.

#### PART 106 UPDATED

USPA Part 106, "Ratings", covering jumpmaster, Instructor and Instructor/ Examiner ratings has be upgraded. More instructional experience willbe required in each area. It should go into effect in May 1971.
