THE KEN DOBELL MEMORIAL 10-MAN MEET, OTAY VALLEY, SAN DIEGO. This usually sunny valley turned dark for the Saturday start of the annual Ken Dobell 10-Man Star Meet October 14. Three Twin Beeches, a DC-3 and 11 competition teams sat on the ground and waited for blue. Sunday cleared enough for four good rounds. Ten of the 11 teams entered were from So. Calif.; one from Arizona.

It was a fast meet. Teams placing one thru four made all ten-mans and AVERAGED 28 seconds or less. National champions Jerry Bird's All-Stars took first with an average of 24.9; the Flying Farkle Family (revised) were runners-up with 27.0; a new team, NWLF, 3rd, and Arizona, 4th. Fastest star was out of the DC-3 by the All-Stars. . . 18.8 seconds.

MISSOULA \$\$MONEY\$\$ 10-MAN MEET, MONTANA. Ten crisp \$100 bills with a 10-man stamped imprint went to Jerry Bird's All-Stars for their first place win at the money meet of the year. Friday and Saturday the weatherman presented crappy weather. Eight teams from all over the Northwest USA, Calif.and Canada drooled over 3 sanitary D-18's and 2 DC-3's and waited for clear weather which came 11:00 am Sunday to blast off 4 rounds. All-Stars won with a 24.5-second average followed by Seattle with 28.5 seconds.

The first and second place teams both credit sequential, multiple-maneuver RW for their success. J.Bird said, "DC-3 exits make subterminal RW skill a must. Subterminal work gives you ability to cope with traffic jams and to establish a pattern for building the star in a smooth manner... You learn to judge the construction activity and time your entry... Subterminal cleans up your in-close RW act."

The 2nd place Seattle team was built of two 4-man RW teams, plus two. Besides big money, Montana provided big boogie and a world-record 11-man moon on the dance floor. . .great band, good activities.

TEXAS TRIP-OUT. The Sutton Memorial Ten-Man Meet-Party at Valley Mills in October was termed a blast by all who attended from as far away as California, Ohio, Illinois and Florida. "Those crazy Texans" put on a party and a meet that'll be talked about until next year's. Their format was a good one for a fun-type, yet serious, meet: five jumps, three of them plain ol' vanilla 10-mans, one a reverse order and one a "draw-your-position-from-a-hat."

When the dust cleared from the hot and heavy competition, V-Mills came up the winner, followed by the Greene County-Atlanta group and Kansas Homegrown, third. Texas walked off with the C.G.Godfrog Good-Times and Good-Vibes Award, too, which was originally presented at the Nationals to A-1 Unlimited.

STAR-CREST SCRAMBLES. Ted Webster's 1972 StarCrest Scrambles and Tracking Contest was the biggest FUN parachuting event I've ever been to. Twenty-nine teams. That's 232 skydivers doing it out of three Twin Beeches and a DC-3. Many of the World Meet contestants stayed in the USA for the Labor Day Event. The scheduled RW consisted of three jumps: an 8-man star; an 8-man snowflake;

and an 8-man line. There was also lots of unscheduled RW including a 50-50 girl/guy 16-man attempt and several 30+ large-star attempts. Pete Gruber organized an All-Nation Star with RW people from other countries participating.

In addition to the many countries represented, it seemed that every state had a contingent. Arizona, Colorado, Kansas, Arkansas, Texas, Georgia, Ohio, Illinois, Oregon, Washington, etc. etc. Lotsa RW folks came to do RW and Boogie. Ted Webster had a Boogie Band and beer for Saturday night. The RW skill average of contestants was quite high. Many of the teams got it together in under 30 seconds!

You should consider having an 8-man SCR Scrambles meet in your area. This type of low pressure/high fun meet does a lot to promote RW. Remember the famous words of C.G.Godfrog, "Everybody is a one-man star; to build something bigger you gotta do RW!"

THE FIRST RELATIVE WORK FESTIVAL. A beautiful new event happened. . .a lot of people who love to jump outa airplanes in groups drove a buncha miles to be with their people in Richmond, Indiana September 9-10. A hundred-twenty RWers jumped at the first RW Festival...there were no prizes or competition, there were no judges or hassles, just RW for the sake of RW. The City of Richmond hosted it, Tag Taggard honcho-ed it and everybody loved it.

The city charged admission to whuffo cars and made several thousands of dollars to support the Boy's Club. The RW people made several big stars out of a Twin Beech and a DC-3. All the self-styled super-hero RW types made three tries at a 30-man and succeeded in FUBAR-ing all three in front of the lens of Carl Boenish. Two Stormville, N.Y. jumpers, two Hinckley "flyers" and one Indiana man deserve special mention for heads-up-the-ass arm flapping (the film is available from RW Underground.) One N.Y.-er was thrown off all subsequent loads for taking one out..."It wasn't me!!"...So he put himself back on the load and took it out TWICE the second time. Everyone else just giggled and went up and made 18-mans and other big round things with no problems on "garbage" loads. Saturday night saw bonfire, boogie and the most beautiful RW films ever seen...Carl Boenish's great flicks of Jerry Bird's All-Stars flying at the XI World Meet.

I believe the Richmond RW Festival was wonderful for the sport. The fact that 120 people from all over the Eastern half of the USA (plus Calif., Australia and Montana) came reflects the tremendous interest in good ol' RW jumping. I doubt that any recent local competition drew as many people. A lot of people had a lot of fun. More people oughta have old-fashioned RW Festivals, trackin' contests and Scrambles.

FORMATIONS OTHER THAN STARS IN RW COMPETITION?

IN THE FRENCH RESTAURANT

This question drew predominantly foot favorable replies. About 20 per cent of respondents felt that while non-star formations should be included we oughta wait until after the '73 RW Nationals. One said "no". The feeling seems to be --wait 'til 10-mans are going good, then upgrade -- but not let 10-mans petrify into a mechanical ritual-like style of competition.

TEAM NEWS

The U.S. Army Parachute Team. Capt. Larry Spence, SCS-430, writes: "I guess you've heard about our 10-man team by now...The interest around here is unbelievable! Our practices have been few and far between, but have really been encouraging so far. Our first meet will be the 10-man competition at Z-Hills in November. Whether or not we'll go to the '73 Nationals depends a lot on our next season's schedule and how we do at Z-Hills."

V-Mills, Texas is gloating over their recent win at the Texas Party/Meet. The team has reorganized under Phil Mayfield as captain. They've been practicing all summer out of their DZ's DC-3.

Pieces of Eight and Get It Together (East coast) have changed little personnel-wise since last year. "Times are good and are shrinking fast. These two East coast teams should make headlines," says one correspondent.

The James Gang and Godfrogs (Illinois) are suffering from bad weather and sick aircraft. The Godfrogs are a new group and are starting to click together. The James Gang has made only about a dozen practice jumps but things look good and times are edging downward.

Ten High Bunch (Z-Hills, Fla.) "haven't been doing much," according to Billy Revis who they sent on a scout-out tour of the RW DZ's around the country.

Greene County-Atlanta has shown that the answer to good RW is RW itself; not necessarily a big plane. Having practiced lotsa 8-mans out of two Cessna 180's they won 2nd place at the Texas meet where they also made their first 10-man on their first opportunity.

St. Louis-Greeneville has a new team with the usual normal start-up problems.

Greene County-Kenia (Ohio) just got a beautiful bright green Twin Beech. They are putting a team together, too, and are expected to appear at Z-Hills.

Arizona. I jumped with some of the Arizona people at the Elsinore SCR Scrambles. Good people. Everyone, big and small, wears the bells.

Northwest. Not much news from these teams but the Oregon State Championships produced a 15-man and a couple of night stars (8 and 9). The Missoula team also plans an appearance at Z-Hills.

Flying Farkles. Have reorganized with Bill Boles as captain and have beautiful Patti Wilson on the team (she just received her gold wings.) Only 4 of the original Farkles are on this "new" entirely different team.

Jerry Bird's All-Stars are feeling perty good. . . their times averaging 25 seconds in both practice and meets. They plan to win Z-Hills and take a little Florida west with them.

Denver-Colombine. There's been an influx of Elsinore RW people to sweeten the RW. Some are gonna try out Z-Hills.

Beech-Nuts (Kalamazoo, Mich.) are getting ready for Z-Hills, too. Three weeks of bad weather prompted a fly-over to Illinois one recent weekend in a search for blue -- one jump and their D-18 fritzed out, stranding the team 'til Monday.

Riche's Raiders (New Orleans). This team has been having more fun than wins lately, but are planning a "comeback" at Z-Hills.

Kansas Homegrown looked good in their 3rd place win at the Texas meet. Some of their members drive faithfully many hundreds of miles every weekend for practice.

Incredible Ten-Man Flying Machine is a new team in the Carolinas, practicing for Z-Hills.

A-l Jumpsuits are truly THE RW swoop-suit. If you don't jump the bell-cuffs yet it seems likely you will soon. Benefits: more stopping power, more recovery power, more control surface. A-l bells start at \$60.00.6-wk. delivery. You can write us for an order form.

The Para-Sled is touted to be 10 lbs. lighter and easier to fly than the Cloud. Aero Foil Systems, its maker, will sponsor a 4-man RW team from their Florida DZ near Cape Canaveral, Pete Picciolo reports. Sounds like an interesting idea.

The MK-3 "Competition" PC can be coaxed to open by more tension on the toggle lines, pumping the control lines on opening, or by switching to a bag. Any other ideas? Prayers and curses help a little.

If compact, <u>light-weight</u> parachute gear is good then feather-weight parachute gear is better. Right? So the Wild Man from Wisconsin (Jack Wallace) gets a bargain on a Tri-Con reserve canopy and rigs it into a dwarf-midget system (bagged) on his back. Small! Jack says the lower mass flies better. Descent is like a PC; removing the mesh gives faster turns. But don't try to open in a track, he warns.

VHO'S BURIED IN GRANT'S TOMB?

Ve're Looking for People Who Want to Be In-the-Know

SPONTANEOUS DEMONSTRATIONS APPLAUD RW'ERS AT XI WORLD MEET. Relative work stole the show at the World Meet. The French, English, Russians and other top competitors from all over the world gave the USA National Champion 4-Man and 10-Man RW teams several standing, cheering ovations for their demos. Everyone knew at least two words of English: "All-Stars" . . and "Outa-Sight." At the USPA/World Awards the officials "forgot" to present the RW People and when a competitor from South America stood up and hollered out the glaring omission the whole place went bananas.

Jerry Bird's All-Stars made 27 demo jumps, and you can understand from the jumps why RW had such far-reaching impact. Here's a sample. . .

* 10-man star, to line, to two 5-mans



* snowflake, to a star

* all men wear smoke. . . snowflake, then the outer five track. (EVERYBODY liked this one. Simple, but a real crowd-pleaser.)

The All-Stars showed how easy RW is when you do it right. They did their job very well. Good RW promotes itself.

TWENTY-SIX (26!)-MAN STAR AT XI WORLD MEET. It just happened. It was supposed to be mainly just a free, fun mass jump/star attempt. Three monster helicopters chugged up to about 11-grand and 28 RW'ers jumped at once from both sides. 25 for the star plus 3 cameramen. It built to 22 and broke. Three people entered on this line to make 25 as they flew it back together (can you imagine trying to fly a 25-man line??) One of the camermen got antsy, couldn't stand it any longer and entered. It broke again at about 5-grand and everyone did a severe track. The beautiful thing about it was the fact that it was a true RW-USA star. . .Army guys, East coasters, Southerners, Mid-Westerners, West coasters, etc. Everyone got together. . . and got together.

Dan Poynter writes: "Many thanks for the fine RW UNDERGROUND; put me on the mailing list... Yes, the 'XX-Rated' star over Stormville was a joint effort by Pieces of Eight and Get It Together. It was done on the first try with twenty participants. I then left for Boston and they went back to make a 19-man. The next day we made several in the high teens. We would like to crack the record but we lack a sufficient number with the requisite talent. Maybe in a month or two... One one attempt at Stormville (29 out) we suffered a collision on a reformation. Pete Svirha broke his leg. On the same jump, George Morris cutaway and landed in the Greenhaven Prison. Luckily between the walls. In the center yard: the rejects from Attica.

"We have a 59 passenger Skool bus for the Z-Hills trip. It is being outfitted now. We just applied for special plates: "TEN-MAN". Best regards from USPA Board's most active relative worker, "

SPECIAL ROCKY J. SQUIRREL HOT RW HINT:

There are three basic track-approach techniques used on competition 10-mans. . . 1) down, then across and enter; 2) straight 45° angle from the airchine and in, and 3) horizontally, then dive down vertically. The first is the slowest, and while safer for novices, is actually hard to control. I can't figure out if #2 or #3 is the faster. #3 sure is fun tho. . .you have your eye on the star the whole time. (Any traditionalists who might want to argue... I didn't develop these... I just copied some people who consistently get in sooner than other people.) You have any ideas? If you're good at RW theory share it with other RW nuts.

SECURITY PARACHUTE COMPANY has been busy making the new Papillions, causing grief to people who have ordered other types of gear from them. The backorders should be filled soon.

THE RW COUNCIL. The Relative Work Council is a loosely knit group of active relative workers who are banding together to see that better things happen for RW more quickly. Some 42 relative workers at the Nationals, representing both 4-man and 10-man RW, agreed there was a need. The RW Council will act so supplement rather than supplant USPA. The USPA Competition Committee (J.P. Thacker and J.R. West) recognize the Council as an advisor to the Committee. All RW Council members must be active in RW and should be a member of a 4-man or a 10-man team. In addition, Council members must be SCR.

This newsletter will serve as the communications media for the Council. Duties of all RW Council members are: 1) to voice their opinions concerning the improvement of RW competition to USPA, fellow jumpers and this newsletter, 2) actively promote RW, and 3) make lotsa RW jumps. There will be no "Mr. Big" or non-jumping paper-pushers. All RW people will have an equal say in controlling their sport. There are no numbers or merit badges except for the SCR and SCS.

Proposals of the RW Council (so far) are:

- ** 1. That circus exits be eliminated from both 4 and 10-man RW at the Nationals.
 - 2. That since more USPA members are active in RW than in style/accuracy, USPA spend more money for the benefit of RW.
 - 3. That other formations besides stars be added to competition.
- ** 4. That USPA refrain from prying into the private lives of parachutists.



** The USPA ratified these at the Board of Directors meeting in Tahlequah (see Parachutist, Oct. 1972, p. 30.)
