

It was just a year ago today that a buddy of mine, a guy we all called the "Old Eagle", bought himself a small share of our drop zone by not pulling. No one knows what really happened, for he was a good jumper . . . he just didn't pull. The guys with him said they waved him off at 2200 and he just smiled and kept on going. Things were pretty sad around the airport for awhile after that; and we all missed him at our weekly brew-drinking sessions. It seemed strange not to hear his laugh and hear him call out, "Greetings, fellow eagles", but the faithful healer of all wounds . . . time . . . came along and soon he was just a vague memory. The jumpers that knew him drifted away and the new students grew tired to hearing the stories of someone they never knew. So, the Old Eagle was stored away in the dusty files of my memory, only to be brought out when I was sitting by myself at the DZ after the last lift and just watching another beautiful day fade away. It was just such a day today . . . the first anniversary of the Eagle's death . . . that just at the last moment before the sun went down, I decided to get in one more jump. I caught our pilot, a wisened gray-haired ex-bomber pilot, and asked him if I could make one by myself. Usually he would have said "no"; it would be too expensive; but he too remembered the Eagle. He had flown him many times and he often commented on the booming laughter you could hear as the Old Eagle left the plane; so Jack just smiled and said, "Suit up. We'll get what we can before sundown".

Sitting alone on the floor of our 182, looking out at the fading day, I felt a sense of peace and well-being that only another jumper could understand. The drop zone was already in shadows and here in the sky was the last warm ray of the dying sun . . . I knew that this would be a great jump. At eight-grand, Jack nodded to me and turned in on jump run. Normally, I am not the world's best spotter . . . as the Eagle used to say, "if you let this guy spot, carry cab fare" . . . but this time I could do no wrong. It was as if I had the greatest jumpmaster of them all peering over my shoulder. As I came over the spot, I called for a cut and sailed out the door. As I did, I wondered what was so funny, for as I made my exit, I thought I could hear Jack laughing. I checked to make sure I was over the spot, and to my amazement I knew that this time I wouldn't have to track . . . everything was

perfect. It was about then that I saw the reason for this story . . .

Slowly gliding in on me was the shadowy figure of a jumper. I couldn't believe my eyes. I knew I had been alone in the plane, but there he was ... white Bell helmet, dark goggles, and a big grin on his face. The same grin I had seen a hundred times or more. I felt the soft touch of his hand as he made the perfect hook-up; for just a second we held, and then he let go and turned away. I could only lay there, completely paralyzed, watching him fade away. But just as he was almost gone, he turned and I realized that he was giving me his final wave-off. I shook my head, glanced at my altimeter and pulled; right on 2200. As my PC glided toward the ground, I wondered what tricks my vision and my brain had played on me. Was I getting too old to be playing this game? Had I hit the ground too hard too many times? Or, was I finally just coming unhinged?

As I walked to the packing area, I kept searching the sky . . . looking for I don't know

what. The only thing visible was Jack circling to bring the plane in.

I met him as he stepped out of the plane . . . neither of us saying a word. We just looked at each other and I knew it wasn't him that had laughed as I left the aircraft. Jack gazed at the sky for a moment and as he turned to walk to the Pilot's Shack, he said, ''Good hook-up, guy''.

I don't guess I will join the crowd at the pub tonight. I think I'll go somewhere by my-

self and have a few. But then, maybe I won't be by myself . . .

Maybe none of us are ever really by ourselves.

BRAD GAGNE WOUNDED IN VIETNAM

Formerly one of Midwest Sport Parachuting Center's most active jumpers, and a one-time member of the U.S. Army Parachute Team, Brad Gagne was wounded in Vietnam on February 7, 1968. He stepped on a land mine and blew off one leg above the knee and injured the other. Brad (while jumping with the Midwest SPC, Taylor, Michigan), established the rather dubious honor of U.S. Streaking Champion by traveling 3½ miles down a state highway. This was properly witnessed by 3 "D" license holders. Bob McTaggart, D-176,

speaks for Brad's many friends and jumpbuddies in wishing him a speedy recovery and in Bob's own words, "Knowing Brad as we do, we are sure he will bounce back with an artificial leg and continue his jumping career (and streaking) if challenged." Any interested friends can contact Brad by writing:

The trophy, in it's illuminated case, has been setting in the Lakehurst Naval Air Station club for a year and was sprung loose just long enough to be given back. Mac won with a total of 112 points earned in five meets spread through the summer. Winner of the Intermediate award was Bernie McDyer (Atlantic) with 54 points; and the Novice award went to Joe Longobardi (Lakewood Skydivers) with 23 points.

MEPA's 1968 summer schedule of either five or six meets will be determined at the MEPA annual business meeting, scheduled for sometime in March. At that time, other clubs interested in affiliating will be invited to attend, and those groups wishing to host a meet will be given their chance to divide up the available dates.

LARRY MODRELL REPORTS ON SO. OREGON SPORT PARACHUTE CLUB

We number about 20 active members and have a Cessna 185 and a pea-gravel target. I am the training officer and our training program consists of a 3-weekend ground training course which includes parachute packing and regular ground school procedures, followed by a written examination. Our club instructors are required to have at least 100 freefalls prior to any training or jumpmastering of students. Each student is required to spend a considerable amount of time in the suspended harness for reserve

deployment and canopy control. We don't have all the answers yet but we are doing out best. We feel the student is the most important part of the sport and without him, the sport would not perpetuate itself. Without the student, the sport could easily die out entirely. The majority of our members USPA members and we support the national organization even though we are not an affiliated club. We subscribe to DZ-USA and find it to be the most informative magazine on the market. I am particularly interested in the malfunction and reserve deployment information and this aspect alone makes DZ-USA the most superior publication available to sport parachutists. 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



Jerry Ryburn and Gene Ritchie, MacDill AFB, Tampa, Florida were down for the first day of the meet, and Roy Johnson showed up on the last day for a month of style jumps. The Canadian Team (Harry Cole and Capt. Costello) were also staying on for training jumps before returning to Canada. And, of course, Rick Miller, DZ-USA Field Representative, was on hand taking most of the photographs included in this article.

THE COMPETITION

The style event was eliminated this year and everyone jumped accuracy only. 7 jumps for individual accuracy and 2 team jumps was the ticket with \$1300 in prize money at stake, plus trophies. There weren't any great surprises in the outcome, with the exception of Bob Jenks, who jumps at Steve Snyder's Ripcord Para-Center. The 18-year-old took second place with less than 300 jumps on a Para-Commander and 2678 points out of a possible 3500. Bob has logged over 20 deadcenters in his short jumping career, and with a lot of work, could be a man to watch. Roger Wolford, who picked up his Gold Wings just before the meet, walked off with first place with 3217 points. His total distance for seven jumps was less than 3 meters. Surprisingly, not one member of the U.S. Army Parachute Team was in the top 10. The USAPT took the Team Event, however, with 5 deadcenters and a meter-plus, which makes one wonder . . . Just how many deadcenters were logged during the meet is unknown to this editor but "a batch" would be a conservative estimate. Rick Schmidt, Minneapolis, put 2 deadcenters back-to-back with only 50 jumps on a PC and a total of 100 jumps since his first one less than two years ago. Rick had the misfortune of malfunctioning on the last jump of the meet (a tuck under) but ended up with a respectable score for any

jumper with his experience. Bill Ottley ("Super Skull") was carried to the center of the target and placed on (or under) the deadcenter disc several times, but even the handicap didn't help. I think Bill finished 94th out of 73 contestants. Mike Daubenspeck got up earlier this year and made the DZ on time...he also picked up 2573 points in accuracy and took 3rd. I missed Sauve's smiling face in the top circle this year but David came through on the 2nd place team and wasn't completely out of the running. Billy Lockward kept things

interesting and on one jump he almost cracked-up the spectators and competitors by running into his canopy before it collapsed and continuing his dash until he was completely wrapped up inside it. Between him and his teammate, Sherm Hawkins, they put many smiles on many appreciative faces. These two represent the USAPT very well and put a bright spot in any meet . . . even if Sherm does sport a mustache now.

It is interesting to note that the total jumps for the top 10 in accuracy comes to almost 10,000 (or an average of 1000 jumps per man . . . 951 to be exact). Not to be overlooked, however, is the fact that Bobby Gordon placed 7th with only 150 jumps in his logbook. Only 7 other contestants had less than his 150 jumps, and one of them was a female.

SIDELIGHTS OF THE MEET

Donna Carey had an out jump which was attributed to the new diamond ring on her left hand (put there by "Sky" Huminsky). Seems the sun was too bright and the reflection on the "rock" blinded her . . .

Rick Miller, DZ-USA Field Representative and temporary "cripple", stood helplessly by while National Directors Bill Ottley and Dan Poynter broke his cane. Rick spent the remainder of the meet hobbling on a 49¢ replacement cane and taking the great shots of the meet from a folding chair about 50 feet from the target . . .

Chuck Henderson was the landlord for about five jumpers who slept in his Mayflower Van (truck-type which Chuck makes his living with) for five days. The quarters were more than comfortable with an abundance of furniture mats which made ultra-soft beds in the 40 foot bedroom. The quarters were quiet, never overcrowded, and completely free. I, for one, thank Chuck for accommodations superior to the Seminole Inn . . .

Cappy Connors was somewhat perturbed when I followed his car (carrying his wife in my car) to nearby Stewart, Florida, and not only lost sight of him ahead of me, but went completely past the town and 20 miles too far south. I finally arrived 30 minutes later with his wife, Donna, and had extreme difficulty convincing him that I (or Donna) had gone through the whole town without seeing it . . .

Don Bohun, Harro Trempeneau, and Ralph Shaw (all members of the Carleton SPC, Ontario, Canada) drove 1300 miles to Pop's Place for a couple jumps. Because of a non-availability of jumpmasters and other considerations, they didn't get a single jump in, and ended up going with me to Tampa, Florida, where Jerry Ryburn and Gene Ritchie (Strike Commandos SPC) rolled out the red carpet for them. All three got all the jumps they wanted and returned to Canada more than happy . . .

Harry Burlin, The Chute Shop part-owner, was jumping a PC this year and has brought his opening altitude up considerably from last year. Seems Harry isn't as confident under the PC as the old rag he put over a 1,000 jumps

Steve Snyder made an "on-the-spot" repair of an Altimaster II and taught everyone watching a valuable lesson concerning altimeters. Steve has several new products coming on the market soon and all of them are just short of revolutionary. Steve recently received the Leo Stevens Medal for "the development, testing and promotion into general use of an automatic opener for the reserve parachute", after years of personal

sacrifice and belief in the Sentinel. You can be assured of one sure thing . . if it involves safer jumping, it will come from Steve Snyder Enterprises . . .

One lift during the meet took off with four members who had 7,000 jumps between them. Woody McKay, Bill Ottley, Harry Burlin, and flying Poppenhager were the four in mention. The lift could have been bettered by four other jumpers: Jimmy Godwin (1625); Billy Lockward (1600); Jimmy Davis (1520); and, of course, Poppenhager (2725). The total would have been near 7500 jumps, but then 7000 isn't a student lift. I guess

isn't a student lift, I guess...

And just in case you are interested, the top 3 in accuracy all had their lines shortened on their PC's. The average was about 3 feet cut out of the lines and it would appear it helps. But when you look at the accuracy statistics at the '67 Nationals and consider the lines were not shortened on those PC's, what do you come up with?...

THE NEW YEAR'S PARTY

Just this once, I will please my 2% of subscribers and not give any of the details or happenings during a great time being had by all. It would only disturb the 2% to know that many jumpers were drinking and enjoying themselves and this we can't allow. I will, however, throw in one picture (worth a thousand words) plus one recipe for a drink you should try before you knock it. 



STEVENS PARA-LOFT

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This column is especially for owners of "hog-backs"; piggy-backs; "systems"; or whatever you prefer to call it.

The following letter is from Robert H. V. Pope, Lakehurst, New Jersey, and refers to Gene Ruck's account of a hesitation on a

piggyback after a breakaway:

'Gene stated that he began to hit the container with his elbows in his article and I would like to suggest that he try and hit the container with his elbows on the ground and see how he makes out. The only way possible to hit it with your elbows would be to have it on upside down and mounted high, or have the chest strap in your mouth. I have cut mine away once with complete success and a very rapid deployment and have popped it every time re-pack time comes. When you pop it on the table, the side flaps won't pull away enough to expose the complete chute but the pilot chute has always popped out to the end of the bridle cord. I would say he (Gene Ruck) had one of three things wrong: (1) The pilot chute didn't have enough spring; (2) his bridle cord wasn't long enough to get into the air without having the additional load of the canopy; or (3) the pilot chute caught on something.

I use a 12-inch bridle cord on mine and the pilot chute always goes to the end of it. I use a long bridle so that the pilot chute will get into the air prior to having any weight on it. One way you can assure the side flap pulling away, is to put a cable stop on the ripcord which will pull away the side flap, however, THIS CAN ONLY BE USED IF THE RESERVE LANYARD HAS BEEN REMOVED!!"

And before you start disconnecting the static-line system, better hear the following words straight from Security in a letter to Don Boyles from Dan Abbott, Director of Engineering for Security:

AUTOMATIC RESERVE LANYARD SYSTEM: If we had any doubts whatsoever relative to the Automatic Reserve Lanyard System, the System would be removed and the information so published instructing all Crossbow users to remove them. However, we feel that this system is accurate and safe and firmly believe in the Automatic Lanyard System. It affords a deployment system utilizing the minimum amount of lost time. It is most unfortunate that doubts have arisen over this System and these doubts are predicated on rumors and/or lack of knowledge on the part of the user. It has been our experience that the Crossbow owners, too often, have not bothered to read the manual provided with the harness and container or canopy or complete system when shipped. This manual contains all necessary information relative to servicing, maintenance, operation, cleaning, adjusting, trimming and use. If they would take the time to read the manual, their doubts would be eliminated. The problem is more a matter of education and understanding of the equipment than any imagined lack of reliability of the equipment. We are aware that manuals are not being passed on to 2nd generation Crossbow owners, and at present, a copy of

the current Crossbow Manual will be made available to anyone requesting it, free of charge.

RITS AND DIECES

The pictures of Larry Schell's malfunction in November Sky Diver Magazine were enough to shake many strong-willed jumpers . . . but apparently Larry took everything in stride. The bones have knitted and Larry has and is now wearing his Gold Wings after that last 20 or so for his grand. Welcome back, Larry.

Jim DeLap, D-1040 has received his Gold Wings (number 106) and asked that I don't forget his free subscription to DZ-USA. Jim, that practice was discontinued in 1967. 

DURING MY TRAVELS

In June of last year, I managed a hop on a Lear Jet (''bum'' type and absolutely free) and ended up in Hartford, Connecticut. From the airport I went to Warehouse Point, and sucked up Dick Barber's beer until he got home from work, and from there to Vic Deveau's pad. It was close to the weekend, so the next stop was Orange, Massachusetts. I'll pick up on the tour from there.

Because of a low overcast, light rain, and generally lousy weather, the first day was spent talking with Butch Rubb, Dan Poynter, Pat Gorham, Bill Viets, Lew Sanborn, and Steve Boyle (manager of Orange). Butch gave me a lift in the shuttle-truck from the flight line out to the "bowl" and if nothing else about Orange's facilities impresses you . . . the size of that target will. The winds can sometimes fool you coming into that super-DZ but it's quite a pile of sand. There is also a complete communication system on the target, including a phone to the flight line; loud-speaker for talking in students; and always a qualified instructor to man them during jump operations. From there, we went back to the flight line and I got a look at the two Norseman aircraft. They are big and beefy and slow but unique. Students must exit from the left side and have one small step to balance on, but the safety record doesn't call for any major changes. So far, no fatalities at Orange since its beginning and speaking of training . . . I sat through one of the sessions and would like to comment on the Telsan (which is the "tel" of Istel and the "san" of Sanborn) System of training used at Orange. You can't argue with success, but nothing is perfect either.

Al Smith was the instructor for a couple students and this phase was excellent. Al spoke clearly, intelligently, and interestingly. So, the flash-cards used in the Telsan System are only as effective as the instructor . . . observation number one. Al, by the way, has since departed the East Coast and is presently in Aeronautical Engineering School in California after putting in 3 years at Orange. He was highly respected by the other instructors and it was easy to see why while listening to his delivery to new students. All in all, the system was comprehensive but short. The pull and punch' method for reserve deployment is inadequate and almost relies on the fact that the student will not malfunction in the first place. Sentinels are on all Student reserves and radio-equipped. The pilotchute assist system is used in addition. This may account for the lack of time spent on reserve deployments. Overall, however, the course is fair and prepares a jumper-prospect to a satisfactory level of awareness of his equipment and procedures. Again, Al's method of instruction was flawless and is an integral part of the system.

Next was PLF training by Butch Rubb and the first thing that came to mind, "wonder if I could still whip out several hundred a day without dying from the pain?" Butch pulls those elbows in and makes you tired just watching, but its a good presentation and every student walks away knowing how and

why a PLF is necessary. Butch's training segment also includes exits from a mock-up of the Norseman (or 180 if that's the case), and this phase is complete in every respect. Some of the instructors we are speaking of are pictured below. Back row, left to right, is



Al Smith; Chuck Embry (glasses and back of the group); John Carlson; and Bill Taft. Front row, left to right, is Howie White; Butch Rubb; and Judd Raymond. Carlson just started this year at Orange (working weekends), and Bill Taft is the ASO for Connecticut and a charter member of CPI (Conn. Parachutists, Inc.). Howie White is a reporter for a large Boston newspaper; and Judd Raymond holds a commercial pilot's ticket. A very impressive group, though some of the faces have changed at Orange since I visited them.

I also met Fred Petersen, the Magnificent Packing Machine, which is still an unbelievable memory when I reflect on his speed of packing . . . and not a malfunction in a carload. I also recall a man walking up to me and saying, "Hello, I am Jacques Istel." Never did find out what his exact duties were but he was everyplace and sending up weather balloons every thirty minutes. Someone said he was riding bulls in Oklahoma a


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year or so ago... so he must not live there. Seriously, Jacques has made many contributions to sport parachuting, and should never be sold short. With a man named Lew Sanborn; and a couple other guys known as Deke Sonnichsen and Darrell Branstetter, Jacques was a member of the first formal U.S. Team to compete in international competition. It was 1957 and Joe Crane was Head of Delegation. The total jumps of all four men (Istel, Sanborn, Sonnichsen, and Branstetter) was less than the least experienced Russian girl competing for her country in the Adriatic Cup, Tivat, Yugoslavia. We've come a long way since then, thanks to them.

My visit to "The Inn" was covered in the July issue, so that about winds it up. I would like, however, to thank the personnel at Orange for their hospitality and assistance, and Gene Parrott, Chief Pilot for the Fuller Brush Company who flew me there in the "Punkin". 
