




It was chilly in Hammond but the weather held and there was a goodly number of bodies showing up for the greatest fun meet of the year. The jumping consisted of some real weird events, including a sack race...and the most hilarious "happening" I've witnessed in 5 years of sport parachuting. The winners were just as surprising as anything else in the meet. First place accuracy went to Ito Iglesias...who was jumping a cheapo! But I'm getting ahead of myself.

The jumping kicked off Saturday morning and, as I said, it was chilly. It had snowed the day before....the first time in NINE YEARS in Hammond....and many jumpers were bundling up for that first lift. With near 60 contestants. I'll list a cross-section instead of every name: Nokey Klutts, Edmond, Oklahoma; John Goad, Fayetteville, Arkansas; Lowell Bachman, Chicago, Illinois; Robert Blanchard, Milton, Florida; Dennis Clark, Dallas, Texas; Herb Thorton, Mobile, Alabama; Ed Lowder, Macon, Georgia; Laura MacKenzie, Fairfield, Conn.; Ray MacGuire, So. Milwaukee, Wisconsin; Jim Couchman, Meridian, Mississippi; Ron Carter, Memphis, Tennessee; and Henry Conner, Lake Charles, Louisiana. How's that for starters? Twelve states ain't bad for a meet to boast of. The judges this year were Ron Radhoff (SMSL #7, whatever that is); Rick Miller (SMSL #40, now you know I was lying); Herb Golden (who offered a re-jump to every contestant who landed with his coveralls unzipped); and Joe Morgan (the "Wing" man). The only DC went to Lowell Bachman who refused to take credit for it. He went against 3 judges and said he missed it... how's that for a switch? To make a great day of jumping short, there were some out-jumps and many dejected walks with a shifty, tricky wind.... and Saturday night....

Well, some of the group went into New Orleans despite themselves. Some of the jumpers had never visited the Crescent City and only wanted to see what it was like and to attend a good opera or Charity Benefit, I'm sure. I'm positive they were not influenced by Mardi Gras and the greatest wide-open party in the world today. Unfortunately, some of the jumpers suffered headaches Sunday morning, but most were caused by driving back to New Orleans....headlight glare and that sort of thing. Seriously, Mardi Gras is worth the drive in itself, and add the meet to that, plus Leon and Prissie's hospitality, and you have an unbeatable combination. This meet is one you should make every year.

Pushing on, Sunday warmed up and the jumping continued. The scores started looking a little lop-sided (probably caused by the Yankees which came down from the North) and the final results showed a Florida team; a Louisiana boy with a name I still can't pronounce; and a Tennessee Bad Guy all tak-

the top slots. The sack-race was, without a doubt, the highlight of the meet. Bob Sprague, all 280-pounds of him, luckily hit the peas and spared the surrounding landscape, and was quite a sight to see hobbling in that sack. Lowell Bachman landed so far out it took him 7 minutes and the help of Carolyn Cascio to hop in. And one group decided to make a "team" sack-race event all their own and came hopping in together: Bob LeBeau, Bob Blanchard, and Jim Gibbs (and dubbed Team #69). Art Derham didn't make out too well during the meet but that is due to absolutely no liquor (not even a beer) in over two months. HODGE-PODGE & CURRENT

In case some of you are wondering what happened to:

Ken Russell (Texas "Gold Winger") Noel Funchess (KNFOADZITUSA hero) Walter Huminsky ("Sky"-type) Jerry Mathwig ("The Wig") Stu Giesick (Oklahoma Pilot-type) David Wilson (Freedom Chuter) Ken Roberts (Indian Giver)

They have all married. It is suggested that all DZ's from coast-to-coast set aside a day of mourning and fly the windsocks from half-mast. Some of these fine jumpers will never again be seen on the DZ; a couple others will make fewer jumps; and only one will continue to jump as usual. Time marches on.

Jay & Joy Courtney (presently in Africa and struggling to continue jumping) have one demonstration jump they won't forget. As soon as Jay hit the ground (at the golf course, Entebbe, Ugenda), an officer of the Uganda Army Air Force rushed up and arrested him, plus confiscating his gear. Jay explained that he had permission for the jump, showed the officer the written permission for the jump, and the officer responded by locking him up at the nearest army camp for five hours. And to add insult to injury, Jay's wife (Joy), and the pilot (Capt. Barute), were also locked up after they accompanied Jay to verify his statements. The sympathetic Africans (with those beautiful military minds) proceeded to interrogate, search, harass, and detain all three people without giving any reason for the military arrest. Personal threats were made to Joy (even though she was not jumping with Jay) and several of the "interviewers" wanted to hold punch-call on Jay. In Jay's words, "My objective over here is to demonstrate the freedom that we, as jumpers,

as we'l as individuals, enjoy at home. However, we must (as we have in the past) combat all forms of "overcontrol" that is being pushed by the airline pilots and the FAA. Editor's Note: You may not be pushed around with fixed bayonets (as Jay was) but making a jump which violated Federal regulations (if such controls ever came about) would be serious enough for at least "detention" even in the United States. Think about it before you are so hot to let FAA continue to put rule after rule into the books. The newest changes to the FAR's (Part 105, Subpart C, Equipment) could conceivably give FAA the authority to tell you what you will jump as a main parachute, and some people are actually for this revision to the present rags. Don't be as unthinking and blind as they are...the new changes are basically good but a couple are another step toward over-control. Keep Jay's story in mind...it may never happen, I agree...but the only thing that can guarantee it will never happen, Is You. Regard all changes and revisions to the FAR's as VITAL issues and never become complacent.

ROCHESTER, NEW YORK: You can't please everyone. Roger K. Kenna returned his NOV-DEC issue of DZ-USA with the following note: "I am just a Sunday jumper who has met an awful lot of nice people in the sport of skydiving and I'm all for the little guy trying to get started or make it on his own, but your magazine is of extremely poor taste. OR: In "DZ" language am returning your latest raq, it's not fit to wipe my butt."

Editor's Note: I have had the same problem, Roger. Those covers are too stiff and just don't seem to get the job done. And as for "poor taste"; you didn't also try to eat that issue, did you?? You must be in a bad way.

DZ-USA is in receipt of a letter from Brad Gagne, still hospitalized in Denver at Fitzsimmons General Hospital, and Brad informs me of an error in the article regarding his being wounded in Vietnam. The article included a statement that Brad is a former member of the U.S. Army Parachute Team, and Brad assures me he was not and has suffered personal embarrassment as a result of the statement. DZ-USA printed the article from information supplied by a friend of Brad's and had no reason to believe the information was incorrect. I, personally, apologize to Major Plummer and the members of the Team for the error and assure you that Brad had no knowledge of the article until it appeared in the March issue of DZ-USA. When some articles must be printed as soon as possible because of the urgency of the contents, there is little time (if any) to check out the source and facts submitted for publication. I am extremely sorry that such was the case when the article on Brad was received. Again, my apologies to Brad and the Team.

WICHITA, KANSAS: A fatality involving twin brothers and the wife of one of them. The date: the summer of 1923. One of the twins flew the old bi-winger; the other did wing-walking; and the wife did the jumping. She was killed when her chute failed to inflate from a 500 foot jump. Source of information: The patient in the next bed to this editor while in the hospital recovering from a damaged kidney from a hard landing. A good example of how far back our public image goes. Everybody has a story about jumpers. that they will never forget.

MARCH AFB, CALIF: Only David Wilson would do something like this: DZ-USA is in receipt of his four-page letter . . . all in shorthand. Knowing that the editor is illiterate probably prompted the foul deed. I also found the educational level of Kansas isn't too high either. I took it to a college professor and he immediately wanted to know where I found it. Seems he thought it was

ancient Greek hieroglyphics.

MONTEVIDEO, MINNESOTA: Gerald Burg gave me a ring awhile back and a couple items should be passed along. Jerry feels that USPA should take advantage of the jumpers who would like to instruct and USPA should provide seminars for such people. Jerry, by the way, has over 200 jumps above 12,500 and over 6 hours of freefall time. This talent going to waste which could be utilized by someone, USPA preferably.

Norman Heaton turned a flat-eight on a style jump last week and he was so pleased and happy about it....he didn't finish the second half.

This issue is a special one (of sorts) for it contains information on clubs and DZ's from coast-to-coast (including some out of the U. S.). I have also included a listing of newsletters which may be of assistance if you are the traveling-type, or just plain interested in other clubs and areas. This issue was prompted by two facts: First, I have had extreme difficulty in working in all the club mail I receive and some of it was becoming out-dated and would soon be unusable (and I hate to see any letter go to waste, as you do, I'm sure), and the second reason was this note from Rick Schmidt, University of Minnesota Skydiving Club (and now the owner of the DZ-USA all-white PC, affectionately known as the "McElfish Special"): "SPRING HAS SPRUNG, AND THE JUMPING IS GREAT!" So, here are a few other clubs who feel the same way. Good jumping this spring and throughout the year.

ALABAMA (BIRMINGHAM):

The Vulcan Sport Parachute Club is a new operation and, at present, is the only club in Birmingham. Gene Crowe, D-1157, is the ASO for the area and says things are off to a good start. He can be contacted by writing P. O. Box 9614, Birmingham, Alabama 35215. Bob (Robert Lee) Hartley is another Birmingham jumper and can be contacted by writing 508 Dyer Drive, Birmingham, Alabama 35206, The operator should have his phone number.

ALABAMA (HUNTSVILLE):

The DZ is at Harvest, Alabama, and with Ron Radhoff and Chuck MacCrone doing the flying (Cessna 182), it is a smooth operation with jump rates lower than most DZ's anywhere. Ron can be contacted by writing 2706 Dry Creek Drive, Huntsville, Alabama 35810 or by calling him at 859-0495, AC 205. Another Huntsville personality is Ray Davis who can be contacted by writing P. O. Box 726, Huntsville, Alabama 35804. As I said before, you'll like those jump rates.

ALABAMA (TUSCALOOSA/BIRMINGHAM):

Some jumpers in this area (such as Gene Crowe) do a lot of jumping in Huntsville with Radhoff's group, however, if you're in the area, give one of the following a ring.... Robert Lee Hartley (508 Dyer Drive, Birmingham, Alabama 35206); Roy Hatch (3608 Brookwood Road, Birmingham 35223); Bob Way (824 10th Avenue, #10, Tuscaloosa, Alabama 35401); or Gene Crow (524 North 21st St., Birmingham, Alabama 35203). The 'Bama Sky Divers (University of Alabama) is near Tuscaloosa and you can write their club at P.O. Box 2125, University of Alabama, University, Alabama 35486. With the information I've given you, you have plenty to find a DZ with.

ALABAMA (MOBILE):

See C. King Pickett (P.O. Box 6241, Mobile, Alabama 36606); Max Kelly (4825 Auburn Drive, Mobile 36618; Skip Van Antwerp (1001 Auburn Drive, Mobile 36618) or give Bob Blanchard a call in Milton, Florida. I know many of these guys put in quite a few jumps with Leon and Prissie Riche at the Southern Parachute Center at Hammond, Louisiana, so maybe your best bet would be to write before you drop in and surprise anyone.

ALABAMA (OPELIKA):

Northwest of Columbus, Georgia, this is Auburn University's DZ and home of Gil Branson and John Murray, plus many other jumpers from the surrounding cities. Opelika is the DZ and you can call Gil for the directions. The University operation is affiliated with NCPL but you don't have to be a student to jump at Opelika. Write John Murray at 104 Hemlock Drive, Auburn, Alabama 36830 or Gil at P.O. Box 1014, Auburn, Alabama 36830.

ALASKA (ANCHORAGE):

I haven't heard from this area in a while but Marcia Rohn (313 East 13th Avenue, Anchorage, Alaska 99501) would be one person to contact. Another would be Leo Fancher (The World's Most Beautiful Jumper) at P. O. Box 3-3912, Anchorage, Alaska 99501. Things are going strong in the spring at the International DZ with jumpers from the Anchorage Club, the Alaska Skydiver's Club and Fort Richardson Sport Parachute Club. The winter jumping is a little stiff (as shown by the photo) but the white stuff disappears like anyplace else in the world. You can give the Alaska Skydivers a call at 279-1820 or 279-4055. ARIZONA (YUMA):

I have only one address in the files for this area, so here is the whole list: Angel R. Chavez, 970 Rose Wood Drive, Yuma, Arizona 85364. I'm sure he can help you if you'll drop him a line or ask an operator of the Bell System for a little help.

ARIZONA (PHOENIX):

There are two DZ's here....one on Bell Road and 32nd Street, the other at Union Hills Drive and 43rd Avenue. The Bell Road DZ has a C-182, pea-gravel and plowed ground target, and about 40 members. Facilities are a little lacking but fun-jumps is the ticket. The Union Hills DZ has a C-185 and a Twin-Beech (D-18) with a pea-gravel and plowed ground target. There is a shaded area for packing. The club has about 15 active jumpers (including 3 active Gold Wingers), and style jumps and accuracy practice is mixed in with the fun-jumping. Mike Marsh (Rt. 5, Box 693, Phoenix 85009); Dr. W. H. Lockward (Billy's Dad); Terry Cooper (1123) East Sierra Vista, Apt. #5, Phoenix 85020); Jerry Backhaus (2133 W. Nicolet Avenue, Phoenix 85021) and Courtney Varner (3141 W. Joan De Arc Avenue, Phoenix 85029) are some members you can contact.



ARIZONA (TUCSON):

The DZ here is at Ryan Field and the target is very soft sand and plowed ground. There is a C-180, packing tables, restrooms, and Bob Sauer, C-669, who keeps things running smoothly. Rigger service is available and student training is just \$20 for the first jump course. There is year 'round jumping and about 20 experienced and active members in the Avra Valley Skydivers (all members must be at least "B" license holders). All jumpers are welcome and fun-jumping is the order of the day. The address to write is: Bob Sauer, Sells Star Rt., Box 22P, Tucson, Arizona 85700. Bill Ledbetter (of literary fame) is also in the area (7445 E. Hubbell, Scottsdale, Arizona 85257) and could fill you in on anything I've left out. Kurt Grant; Jay Miller (6502 E. Santa Aurelia, Tucson (85715); and Pastor Carl E. Groom are club members you'll meet most any weekend.

ARKANSAS (IN GENERAL):

Unfortunately, the jumping is almost nil in Arkansas. Billy Kiehl has hung it up, as has other jumpers in the state, and there are only two "D" licenses in the whole state. have a few addresses (scattered) but they may help, Ray A. Hightower, Box 122, Gillett, Arkansas 72055 can help you out if you're in the Clarksdale/Pine Bluff/Greenville area of Arkansas, or just across the line in Mississippi. S/Sgt. Chuck Dobis, U.S. Marine Corp Recruiting Station, Second and Spring Street, Little Rock, Arkansas 72201 will lend a hand if you're in his area and looking for a DZ. George Trousdale is also in Little Rock at 9210 Adkins Road. Bruce Barnes is in the northeastern part of the state (1813 Wood Street, Jonesboro, Arkansas 72401), and he'll help if you are in the Paragould / Jonesboro / Blytheville section. And, of course, John Goad can fill you in on jumping in general throughout

the state. John's address is Rt. #8, Fayette-ville, Arkansas 72701. I don't have anything for the Fort Smith area, but John can also clue you on that part of the state. Lee Walker is in Foreman, Arkansas (Route 2) and you can call him at 542-6231 (AC 501). Past that, I have nothing on any active clubs within the State.

CALIFORNIA (BAKERSFIELD):

This is an airport facility DZ with a hard target. Aircraft includes a C-180, C-172, and a C-206. People to contact include Kurt Hamman, 2413 Alturas Drive, Bakersfield, California 93305. He is also in the book.

CALIFORNIA (ELSINORE):

Some of the keenest competitions in the state are held here. Bill Edwards, D-974, Bill Shear, Bobby Deagen, Hector Nunez, Floyd Glover, D-1851, and David Wilson, D-1144, call the DZ home and hang around the deadcenter disc. Norman Heaton and Lyle Cameron drop in occasionally but the regular faces are affectionately known as the "in group" and fun-jumping and relative work is the only way to go. Aircraft includes a Twin-Beech (the "Elsinore Queen") and a C-180 w/door (called the "Yellow Jacket"). There are three different and separated targets in a 31/2 mile by 21/2 mile valley, plus a lake for water jumps, and rates as follows: 3500 (\$3); 5500 (\$4); 7500 (\$5); 10,500 (\$6.25); and 12,500 (\$7.50), and up. On weekends, your first jump is half price if you arrive on the DZ before 8:30 AM....regardless of altitude. Call 674-2500 (Elsinore DZ) or 674-3500 (Rumbleseat Tavern). There is a snack-bar and restaruant on the premises and some of the faces below will be around:

CALIFORNIA (LAKESIDE):

This DZ is ran by Vance (D-987) and Loretta (D-1142) Breise and they can be contacted by writing 1456 Swallow Drive, El Cajon, California 92020. The DZ is located near San Diego (not far from the Mexican Border) and there is jumping year 'round, primarily on weekends. "Breise" is in the phone book.

CALIFORNIA (TAFT):

This is Art Armstrong's operation and as advertised in Sky Diver Magazine, it is a smooth and well-ran DZ. When Taft gets a 10-man star, Elsinore gets a 10-man. Taft gets a 11-man, and Elsinore gets one....Taft

gets a 12-man....and at present Elsinore is trying for a 14-man star. This is where it happens and if the stars get any bigger, Art will have to extend the sky over his DZ. There are many very good accuracy and style jumpers here and Art conducts a class of instruction for style jumping. In the words of Barbara Roquemore and Donna Connors, "the class knocked at least one or two seconds off their time"....a word to the wise. You can contact Art Armstrong by writing P.O. CALIFORNIA (OCEANSIDE):

Near Oceanside, naturally, and home of the Oceanside Competition Team. Mike and Wendy Corah are frequent visitors (see photo) and Hector Nunez practices accuracy here as well as many other California jumpers. Mike Sams, D-1478; Ray Cottingham, C-3933; Patty Crocitto, C-3713; and Bob Hughes, C-3704, are some of the fun jumpers who drop in occasionally. CALIFORNIA (LANCASTER):

COLORADO (DENVER AREA):

The jumping in this state is concentrated in the Denver area with little else around. Columbine Airport is the regular DZ (west and south of Denver, I believe) and some jumping goes on near the Emerald Isle Tavern, near Cherry Creek Dam on Parker Road. Phone numbers include Tom McFeeters, 444-4112 in Boulder, Colorado; Jim Halbert, 777-3752 in Denver. Kathie Johnson can be contacted by writing 750 Juniper, Golden, Colorado 80401, and she can give you the straight scoop on the Colorado Sport Parachute Council and jumping in the Denver area. Cappy and Donna Connors; Lud Lincoln; Carl Wolf; Art Stanberry; and Skip Brandon are familiar faces on the DZ.

COLORADO (COLORADO SPRINGS):

A new center has recently opened here and Mike Marthaller offers the cheapest rates in Colorado, \$4 up to 7500; with accuracy jumps from 3000 for \$3. The DZ is described as fabulous and located at Meadowlake Airport, complete with a pea-gravel bowl. Almost 6000 acres of drop zone with anything and everything in sport gear offered. Custom harnesses, sales (new and used), PC work, with Mike and Art Ibanez doing some fine work. You can call Mike at 634-0634, Colorado Springs, and Art at 473-4764 (or write him at 1455 Howard Street, Colorado Springs, Colorado 80909). And if two riggers aren't enough, throw in Dick Price for #3. Bill Urbanowski is #1 promotion man and frequent guest, so drop in. Bill is famous for a jump-and-pull from 17,500 feet ASL (along with Allen Hunt and Jim Kavalec) so you may only see him "going over" the state of Colorado.

CONNECTICUT:

As reported by Major J. J. Joyce, except for a very few demo jumps (which requires special permission), the only jumping in the whole state is at Monroe Field, Monroe, Connecticut. It is located southwest of New Haven and the telephone number at the field is 268-9272. The jumping is run by Vinnie Chesto, ASO and over 1200 jumps. He owns the plane and runs the whole show. Jumping usually starts about noon on Saturday and Sunday. The plane is a C-180 and because of the small DZ, it is tough for students, which are not sought nor particularly desired here. Vinnie is very safety conscious and likes to have experienced male jumpers only on the DZ, if possible. The state Aeronautics Commission has granted Major Joyce, D-691, permission to start a club in the New London area, but the Major is expecting orders for a second tour in Vietnam. Major Joyce's number at New London (Groton) is 449-3808 at the Submarine Base there. Club Safety Officer at Monroe is Larry Sargeant, a C-license holder with over 700 jumps. There are a few other regular "C's" with anywhere from 100 to 250 jumps. A 30 at Monroe is \$4 and \$3.50 for anything less than 7200. Jumping was shut-down during the winter months but started again in mid-April.



The Univ. of Illinois SPC has an 80 acre DZ, 50' pea-gravel target, and half-mile sod strip. This could become an annual affair, so write David G. TOWING THE BOW

Have you ever wondered what was next? After you have been jumping for nine (9) years, done everything there was to do in sport parachuting, (both wrong & right)? Well, let me suggest some kicks that are brand new and almost as fun as sport parachuting. Take your ol' trusty X-BO; find a big lake; a good boat, and go tow your bow.

To get ready to tow your bow, all you need is to make a yoke about 21/2 feet long (use harness webbing with quick release snaps on the end) and sew two (2) "V" rings on the front risers about 6" up from the buffer strip that is sewn around the capewell fitting. Now, get yourself at least 200' of tow rope and a standard nylon tow rope (1200 lb.) is o.k. If you want to be sure, get 1500 lb. tow rope or 2000 lb. tubular nylon. You'll need a good boat with at least a 60 H.P. engine to keep you flying without getting wet. 100 H.P. engine is tops because the more speed you can get the higher you can go. With 200' of tow line you go straight up from the tow boat.

At Table Rock Lake (in Southern MO), the government has built some large public ramps for the everyday folks to launch boats from and this is our launching pad for the bow. This way you don't have to fight with water skis. Wear a old football helmet, ski belt, and tennis shoes and off you go.

I found that the X-BO is almost indestructible in any kind of situations. You can drag it out of the water, sopping wet; lay it on the ramp; and by the time you have someone else harnessed up, you're ready to go again. It flys just as well wet as dry and you can do the same bit over again. Incidentally, I've put about 25 jumps on my X-BO since using it behind a boat, and haven't so much as a stretched line.


After your tow line is straight, have a couple of people hold the sides of the canopy open to let some air into it and then hit the boat full bore. The boat will start you running down the ramp, the X-BO will start you up and you're flying by the time you get to the water. You should always start off into wind, then after you're up, you can go anywhere there is water. Allow yourself enough room to make a very shallow 180-turn if you want to get back to the ramp where you started.

In the air, the X-BO is stable and you can just about fly it without using the toggles at all. If the Bow starts to slide off to one side, all that is needed is little jerky tugs on the opposite toggle to set it straight. You can let it alone and it will correct itself most of the time.

The only time you have to be on your toes is when you start to turn around. This has to be done very shallow and with maximum speed to keep the canopy from trying to wind cock. If you goof, don't sweat it, all that will happen is the canopy will stop flying and you're going in for a dunking. After youmake it back to the ramp where you started, all you have to do is cut the power and make a water landing close to the shore. Don't try to make the ramp....that's bad news and I had

eight stitches and a healthy scare for proof in my knee.

After you get use to towing the canopy, you can play "wipe out the man in the canopy" by slowing down the boat. This causes the canopy to settle and you can make the guy in the harness run along on top of the water if you are good enough with the boat. By speeding up the boat you can raise the canopy back into the air again.



So, X-BO owners, rejoice! A use for your second best has come about! No worry about back injuries from hard openings; broken legs from stalling out on a down wind approach; and you can impress all the girls with your new found prize. I'm looking forward to running the editor of DZ-USA on top of the water for a mile or so.



JUMPING IN JAPAN Byline: Robert C. Le Beau, D-1491

Located just 85 miles east of the busy city of Hong Kong, is the village of Nepitune. This peaceful, sleepy, little Japanese village jumps alive on weekends, however, for it is the home of Japan's largest sport parachuting club. Although Japan has many large jump clubs, Nepitune is the largest due to young and old alike jumping there. When I landed in Japan, I found out about the Nepitune club in short order. I went immediately to the DZ and surprise number one was a surplus World War II Japanese kamikaze hanger which was the club house. The next oddity was the flying of a weighted kite on a 2000 foot line which was used for a winddrift indicator. When the kite stretches to the end of the line, jumpers walk until they are directly under the kite and mark the spot on the ground with lime, much the same as we do on football fields.

After the exit point is determined, the job of manifesting begins. This is not an easy task due to the old customs and respect for the older jumpers. I found that this takes much too long, due to the slowness of the older jumpers to respond to their numbers and get their equipment ready. However, the older jumpers set a good example for the younger ones.

The target used is a bit larger than most and is filled with 2½ feet of surplus rice from the village. The rice turns a bit brown in color

and requires constant stirring with large sticks, but it makes an excellent substance for soft landings when the older jumpers come screaming in downwind.

The jump plane is a Japanese built "Volture" and is powered by a large engine which I haven't the vaguest idea of a name for. The sturdy craft holds five freefallers and three static-liners, and has a variable climb propeller which helped a great deal during climb-out.

The majority of the club jumps canopies very similar to an American PC, however, theirs are made in Japan. They call it the Nippon Mark I and will have a Mk II on the market soon. I inquired about buying some equipment and was referred to a Mr. Lousi Loiel Hockman. The club has experienced only seven fatalities in their two years of operation and this is commendable when you consider the total number of jumps made. Most of their fatalities were students who had relied upon the Japanese-made automatic opener. Most of these openers have since been sold to a company in the United States. The device has since been perfected and the Japanese now refer to it as the hari-kari chest-opener.

I inquired about a national governing body for jumpers and they told me all about the Japanese International Parachutist, or JIP as it is called. It's headquarters are versatile and move very easily. The National body's Executive Director is Hee Ton, and the yearly dues are \$10 (American). I sent mine right in and got a JIP'd card back almost immediately. This aspect of their sport is not too different from ours here in the States.

The club also sells a very beautiful patch displaying their club emblem of a fire-breathing dragon which is wearing a Crossbow and making a three-man flame. The club's name (Sok-ittu-Mi Skydivers, Japan) is embroidered in bright red letters above a gold bent pin.

In closing, I would like to thank the ASO, Mr. Dang Poit and the CSO, Mr. Hammil Tong, and the many fine people who extended their hospitality to me while visiting their inter-

esting club.

As I am a world traveler, please watch DZ-USA for other international jump reports by me. I travel near and far and am constantly in search for the truth and the Fountain. I, therefore, run across many DZ's which are off the beaten path.



The other Wichita Parachute Center is at Benton, Kansas, and also offers student instruction, rigger service (by Tom Copenhaver, Hutchinson, Kansas), a C-182, peagravel target, and no obstacles for miles. The regular jumpers include Jerry Little; Jim Jones (out with a knee injury); Art Marker; Jim Nicholson; Tom Copenhaver (soon to be the first Gold Winger in Kansas); Dick Hanna; and Charley Nelson. Exchange jumpers (who jump at both centers) include Connie Cummings, Ron Alexander, Bob Smith, and myself (when I'm lucky enough to be home for a weekend). KENTUCKY (FORT KNOX):

The Knox Sport Parachute Club is an Army club but is off post. The DZ is at Campbells-ville, Kentucky (about 55 miles from Ft. Knox) and the owner of the airport is Mr. Ogen Shipp. They have a C-172 and a C-205, concrete runway, 90-foot sawdust target, and plenty of open fields around the area. Peter Tolles, Lt. Mitchell, Lt. Wettoch, Bob Boswell and Don Hathaway are just some of the members. Jumping is on weekends, rates are low, and all jumpers are welcome. LOUISIANA (ALEXANDRIA):

I don't have any information in the files on this club but Jim Arthur, Box 2358 - 1 ACW, England AFB, Louisiana 71301 or Capt. Royce E. Parker, 36 Culpepper Road, Alexandria, Louisiana 71301 should be able to help you out if you are in the area. The last time Jeff Russell (Hammond) was there he ended up in a 60 foot tree and was found by some deer hunters. They weren't concerned with getting him out, they just wanted to know if he had seen any deer. The DZ isn't near the trees, though, so drop in. Jeff was out in the boonies because of the spot for style jumps. The target is pea-gravel and some of the jumpers are Air Force from the England AFB, and past that, I can't be of much help.

LOUISIANA (HAMMOND):

This DZ is known for the Mardi Gras Meet each year, great Cottonbelt Meets, and Southern Parachute Center, Inc., is the name of some great jumping and hospitality. Leon and Prissie Riche live and breathe sport parachuting and guarantee you'll enjoy yourself while in the New Orleans/Hammond area. The Howard is flying most of the time (when Leon isn't putting dents in it) and a second plane is always available, usually a C-170. The target is pea-gravel and the target area is unobstructed. There is inside packing, a lounge, some of the greatest student training on the map, equipment sales and service, flight training....you name it. Call them at 345-6324 (AC 504), or write P.O. Box 878, Hammond, Louisiana 70401. The center is open 7 days a week and the rates are reasonable. Max Kelly : Leigh and Jeff Russell; Herb Golden; and J. D.(Old Man) Dodson are around occasionally (especially Jeff Russell who made a fantastic number of jumps in just a few months on

this DZ), and you may run into some of the jumpers in the pic below:

MAINE (MILLINOCKET):

The Mid-State SPC is the only club to keep DZ-USA informed of jumping in Maine, which was non-existant during the winter months, but going strong now. E. J. Swett ("The Healthy Animal") is jumping a "Red Baron" PC and there are 2 or 3 other super-chutes around, but mostly it is fun-jumping and enjoying yourself is number one on the guarantee-list". Two members have recently returned from Vietnam (Larry Murphy, C-3496; and Robbie Lycette) and for some reason they have placed wire mesh over the clubhouse windows; sandbagged the area; and mounted an M-60 machinegun in the jump plane. Other than that, things are quite normal (as seen by the photo on the front cover of this issue). Dan Poynter, Northeastern Conference Director, drops in occasionally, and other faces around the drop zone belong to: Gary Dumas; C. Falone; A. C. Murphy; J. F. Kenneson (retired); and Leroy Ashby. MARYLAND(See the NEW YORK/MARYLAND/WASH. D.C. section)

MASSACHUSETTS (ORANGE):

Here is the largest "bowl" in the United States if you want a super target and the most active drop zone around. The aircraft are Norsemen and the March issue of DZ-USA covered the facilities (too numerous to list a second time). Jump rates are a little stiff but you can't have everything. The Connecticut Parachutists, Inc. (CPI) do most of their jumping here and Dick Barber, Vic Deveau, Butch Rubb, Sue Rademaekers, Dan Poynter, John Clark, Ron "Thunderchicken" Blake, and Max Knor are usually somewhere to be found. You may have to fill out a form or two before you jump, and if you are a student, you may have to make a well-observed qualifying jump, but it is the place to go on the east coast if you're north of New York State. Facilities leave nothing to be desired and "The Inn" is the frosting on the cake. And just in case you don't like a Norseman, there is a C-180 around; at least, there was one 8 months ago.

MICHIGAN (NUNICA):

Contact Paul Davids, Ottawa Parachute Service, and he will give you the scoop on the jumping there. I was there last year and the facilities were adequate and they were fly-

ing a C-185. There is a loft available and Paul is a rigger, plus holding an Instructor Rating. It is a 7-day operation and aircraft is available for meets on a rental basis. You can call Paul at 837-6240 (AC 616) or write him at 17077 Charles Street, Nunica, Michigan 49448. Jump rates are reasonable and jumpers like Billie Dolley, Feller DeWitt, and Lou Schroeder have been seen on the DZ.

MICHIGAN (GRAND RAPIDS):

I don't have too much in the files on the Grand Rapids Skydivers but a few addresses will help. In fact, some of the best competitive jumpers in the country are found in Michigan. The fun-jumping is great too....

MICHIGAN (TAYLOR):

This is R. E. (Bob) McTaggart's operation and is called the Midwest Sport Parachuting Center and School of Sky Diving. You can call Bob at 291-40 80 (AC 313) or write him at 7621 Pardee, Taylor, Michigsn 48180. The instruction is excellent and exhibition jumps are a speciality, so student or experienced....this is the place.

MICHIGAN (TECUMSEH):

The weekend operation here is under the guiding hand of Harold Lange and the jumping is at Tecumseh Airport from a C-172 and C-182. Nothing is lacking for student instruction and the first jump is just \$25. John Mooneyham does the rigging (address: Box 53, Manchester, Michigan) and Harold can be contacted by writing 17080 Raupp #16, Melvindale, Michigan 48127.

MINNESOTA (ST. PAUL):

The Minnesota Skydivers Club jumps at Stanton, Minnesota and can be contacted by writing Phil Halper, 2722 East Third Avenue, No. St. Paul, Minn. 55109. Harry Clement is also a member and can be contacted by writing him at 687 W. Hoyt, St. Paul, Minnesota 55117. Other than a jumper named H. Brennan, I don't have too much in the files on this club but the jumping is there and happening. Their 7th Annual Northwest Meet comes off the 3rd and 4th of August, so get acquainted by attending.

MINNESOTA (OSSEO):

Actually, we are still in the St. Paul area but it is a large area and has about 4 DZ's in the immediate area. Other than Stanton, already listed, this listing is for the St. Croix Valley Skydiving Club. Gene Kalscheuer, president. The DZ is at Osceola, Wisconsin and fun-jumping is at the top of the menu....99.9% legal. The club members range from Tom Hall (an 18-year-old high school senior and vice-president of the club), to Ernie Joyner (55 years young and a pillar of the community). There is a heated hanger for repacking and bull-sessions, and the club owns their own C-182 w/jump door. Pea-gravel target, two riggers, and 30's for \$3.00 keeps most of the 30-odd members happy and active. You can get a 45 for \$5 and first jump students are \$35 for the first jump and this includes USPA membership. Dick Wagaman and Ed Dorey drop in occasionally and Art Steffen is ASO (and always around. You can call Gene Kalscheuer at 428-2153 (or write him: P.O. Box 353. Osseo, Minnesota 55369), or Art Steffens at 784-3267 (AC 715).

MINNESOTA (LE SUEUR):

And we are still in the Minneapolis/St. Paul area, but this club is the University of Minnesota Skydivers with Ed Dorey at the helm. It is a new DZ and I have nothing in the files as yet as to facilities and info, but Bob Johnson, Rick Schmidt, and a white PC called the "White Hog" are seen around the DZ almost any weekend. MISSISSIPPI (IN GENERAL):

There may be a lot of jumping in the State, but if there is, I haven't heard about it. If your around the northeast corner of the state, contact Tom Little, P.O. Box 567, Corinth, Mississippi 38834 for assistance. In the Hattiesburg / Laurel / Mobile, Alabama area, contact the DZ-USA Field Representative, Rick Miller (209 So. 29th Avenue, Heritage 105, Hattiesburg, Mississippi 39401).... both will be glad to help out. Here again, many of jumpers in the area use the Mardi Gras section of the country and head for Hammond, Louisiana when they want a leap,

MISSOURI (FULTON):

The Mo-Kan Sport Parachute Center was organized in Fulton in October of '67 at the Fulton Municipal Airport to train students from the Univ. of Missouri in neighboring Columbia, Mo. President of the center concept is Bob Atterberry, D-1300, who is also an ASO for the area. John Meyers, C-1124, is treasurer of the center, and the associates include Doug Williams, D-58, and Ches Judy, USPA Instructor. The airport has paved runways and a C-180 and Cherokee 6 are on hand for the lifts. The field is on U.S. Hiway 54 (24 miles north of Jefferson City and 25 miles east of Columbia). The jumping is on weekends, weather permitting, and there is pea-gravel target with wide open spaces for landings in all directions. MONTANA (BUTTE/HELENA):

Paul Drennon, 112 So. Main Street, Helena, Montana 59601 can give you any information you may require on jumping in this area. There isn't a lot of jumping in Montana (state-wide) but where there is a DZ....the jumping is the same as anyplace else. High ones, fun-jumps, relative work, and the whole ball of wax.

MONTANA (BOZEMAN):

Bob Hosfield (now in Hammond, Louisiana) gave me a club patch of this club and it's all I have to go on. I do have a couple names in Butte, so you can start there: Frank G. Olenick, 312 North Washington Street, Butte, Montana 59701 and Bill Ritchey 715 8th Avenue, Helena, Montana 59601 may help you find a DZ. Just call the operator and ask for their phone numbers. The Treasure State Skydiving Club is somewhere in the area. One last note: If you have a club patch laying around, send it to DZ.USA.... you can't tell what it may be used for.

MONTANA (MISSOULA):

Not too much information on this area but Frank Sanders is the man to contact. You can call him at 549-1034 (AC 406) or write him at 1730 So. 7th West, Missoula, Montana 59801. Frank is also the man to see for some of the best rigger work in Montana. Just ask and you shall receive.

NEBRASKA (OMAHA):

The Omaha Sky Divers, Inc., is based at the Millard, Nebraska Airport 3 miles southwest of Omaha. Twenty members keep the club's C-180 flying and the skymotive door keeps the chill off the high ones. The jump rates for guest jumpers are \$3.50 to 20,000 feet; \$4.50 to 12,000. Lonnie Schaffroth is president of the club (taking over after Stan "Studley" Searles' reign....with Stan now spending more time cooking hamburgers at the Chicken Burger (Stan's Place). Dick Sorensen; Lorrie Meile; Bill Beaver; Joe Slevin; Dick Walkup; and John Randall are some old faces on the DZ, joined recently by Paul Levesque, newest member of OSD. NEBRASKA (LINCOLN):

The Lincoln Sport Parachute Club offers excellent student instruction (including a written exam) and several "D's" who do the training. Total cost for a new student is \$55 for everything right up to freefall (includes his 5 static-lines and his first freefall). He also gets a logbook, USPA membership and Gunby's book on sport parachuting. It is the best DZ going for any student who wants to get started and still have a buck left for a jump. The club was started 9 years ago by Ken Sisler (deceased) and Shorty Janousek and will probably be around when all the others have folded. They fly a PA-20 Pacer and you can contact Shorty by writing 929 Furnas Avenue, Lincoln, Nebraska 68521. Some of the club members included for your information, are: Stan Harroun: George Classey; Jon Grant; Maurice Hoelting; and Ron Bassett. Surely you can get a phone number from that group.

NEBRASKA (MITCHELL):

The Chuting Scotts Parachute Club use a C-172 and jump every Saturday and Sunday, weather permitting. It is \$3.00 for a 15 and \$4.00 for a 30. The DZ is at Mitchell Airport, 9 miles west of Scottsbluff, Nebraska. You can call Jerry Herbster at 635-9567, or write him at Box 373, Student Union, Hiram Scott College, Scottsbluff, Nebraska. It's a new DZ and needs your support....drop in.

NEVADA (LAS VEGAS):

I'll have to be a little prejudiced on this one. The Las Vegas Skydivers have supported DZ-USA from the first issue back in 1966 and receive no less than 14 copies per month. As David Wilson reported (on a stop on his way back to Elsinore), "I stopped in on the Las Vegas SD Club and attended one of their General Meetings. They were very prompt in passing out a copy of DZ-USA to each and every member who attended the meeting". There are two DZ's (back to serious business) with one of them located in Henderson, Nevada and the other called the Thunderbird DZ, also near Las Vegas. NEW HAMPSHIRE (ROCHESTER):

Not too much on file for this area but Safelight Parachute Service is there with a loft at Sanford Airport, Sanford, Maine. Charles E. Dame is the man to contact (522-J, Sanford) and you can write the Parachute Service at 51 Linden Street, Rochester, New Hampshire 03867. You are bound to find something in the way of DZ with Chuck helping.

NEW JERSEY (LAKEHURST):

This is home base for the Naval Air Technical Training Center Parachute Team (Mac Craw, "Team Leader"). The club was formerly the Navy Lakehurst Parachute Club and although the name is longer and a little harder to remember, the jumping is still the same....great and plenty of it. Jumpers like Dale Kite and Chuck Seymour are around to write up the jump stories and get those flicks everyone likes to see. The training is excellent and the club jumps at New Hanover; Applegarth; and other MEPA DZ's, in addition to their own. They jump everything from helos to Twin-Beech's on the base but you don't have to be military to give them a ring or write for information on jumping in their area. You can contact JOC Dale L. If his assistance is anything like his writing, you are sure to get the very best information.

NEW JERSEY (LAKEWOOD):

A Parachutes, Inc. (PI) commercial operation with Nate Pond in charge. I didn't make it by here while on the East Coast, but facilities have to be excellent considering the number of jumps put out here annually. The Center is located on Cedarbridge Road, and you can write Box 258, Lakewood, New Jersey for more information, or call 363-4900 (AC 201) if you're in the area. During the winter months, this is a weekend operation but beginning the 15th of April, it's 7 days.

NEW JERSEY (LUMBERTON):

This is the home of the Ripcord Parachute Center and it is in the Mt. Holly area (east of Philadelphia, Pa.). The DZ is at Lumberton (Hiway 531 south of Mt. Holly about 5 miles) and is owned and operated by Steve Snyder, D-5. Something is always happening here. Maxine Hartman made her 1000th from a hot-air balloon not too long ago; Allan Lance drops in occasionally; Bill Ottley is a frequent visitor; and Rob Jenks ("Boy Wonder" who took second in accuracy at Pop's this year) is usually around. Jumps are from a Stinson "Mule" (jump plane extraordinary) and the plane is worth the trip just to get a jump from it. The target is peas about 3 feet deep and water jumps are possible anytime you want one. The rates are reasonable and there is a cafe right on the DZ plus a loft and equipment sales and rentals. Call Steve at 665-4243 (AC 609), or AM 7-9725 (Mt. Holly). This is one DZ you don't want to miss.

NEW JERSEY (APPLEGARTH):

This is Lenny Potts' place on the map and to be perfectly honest, I don't have one scrap of information in the files. You can contact Bill Ottley (See the NEW YORK/MARYLAND/WASH. D.C. section) and I'm sure he can steer you in the right direction. In the meantime, how about firing something in to DZ-USA if you're in that area, particularly if your name is Potts.

NEW JERSEY (FLEMINGTON):

I don't have the scoop on where the Chute Shop personnel jump, but with Ron Edwards, Harry Burlin, and Johnny Higgins there, you can be assured of a DZ in the area. Call the Chute Shop at 782-5758 (AC 201) and they will direct you from there. You could pick up some equipment and make it a one-shot trip if you're so inclined and I doubt if you'd make Ron unhappy about the call.

NEW MEXICO (ALBUQUERQUE)

The Carters are now in California, so the news from this area has dropped off, however, Beetle Bailey is still around and may help you out if you're in the area. One of the clubs is the Falling Angels SPC and you can write the club (and Beetle) by writing Bill Bailey, 2709 Utah N.E., Albuquerque, New Mexico 87110. The altitude is something like 6,000 feet before you get off the ground but it isn't that bad. Other jumpers in the area are Peter Betz (P.O. NEW YORK/MARYLAND/WASH. D.C.

Some of the New York DZ's are listed separately, but to catch a couple clubs which haven't been keeping in touch, I'll use this catch-all and give you some names to contact for clubs such as the Pelicans of Maryland. Write Bill Ottley. Deputy Director, NAA, 806 15th Street N.W., Washington, D.C. 20005 for information on almost any club in the Maryland, New York, Vermont, Massachusetts, and Connecticut area. Tom Ayo, 1609 30th St. S.E., Washington, D.C. 20020 can also be of assistance...or...Bill Gifford,

2501 Que Street S.E., Washington, D.C. 20020. And one more just in case you may need it... Don Moore, 5002 Leeds Drive, Suitland, Maryland 20023. The Edgewood Arsenal Sky Divers used to be in the Joppa, Maryland area (DZ located at Edgewood, Maryland), so give that area a check-out.

NEW YORK (GARDINER):

The Hudson Valley Skydivers are based here and even the winter didn't stop the jumping For the past few years, no students could be put out because of New York State Law but that has all changed and Gardiner is getting the first jump students on the lifts. \$25 includes everything (USPA membership paid for) and you can be assured of excellent instruction. Experienced jumpers are always welcome and will also find the jump rates within reason. The DZ is on an abandoned airfield with lots of pea-gravel for those inclined to practice accuracy and there are packing tables on the field. The CSO is a "D"; former member of the USAPT; and expert under a PC...however...if you see him missing the peas by about 3000 feet, he is only checking out the new student DZ.... nothing to be alarmed by. Members include Ray Finneran who can be contacted by calling 597-3313 (AC 212) and Bill Bredin, 943-3782 (AC 201). And that CSO, Dan Miller (Who is now ASO); can be called at HA 9-5239 (AC 914). Get your knees in the breeze with Hudson Valley....good advice from Ray Finneran.

NEW YORK (GREENE):

The only addresses in the files which may help are: David O. Lanzendorf, 50 Caton Drive, Apt. 53-C, Syracuse, New York 13214 (and Dave is quite a distance north of Greene) or Tim Saltonstall, RD #2, Ithaca, New York 14850 (if you can catch Tim at home). A few subscribers in this club would help me and you both.

NEW YORK (STORMVILLE):

This is one of the oldest continuous DZ's in the U.S., started back in 1958. Nate Sweet, D-448, USPA Instructor, ASO, and pilot, is the jack-of-all-trades and operator of the DZ. Nate, by the way, is also a senior rigger. It has had it's share of bad publicity but the DZ and everyone connected with it puts safety before everything and has just had some bad luck. If you are in the area, contact Nate by writing hin at Mennella Road, Poughquag, New York 12470. Jumpers from Pennsylvania, Connecticut and other bordering states are always on hand and the jumping is as fine as you will find anywhere. Ken Yegella is also a regular visitor to the DZ and can be contacted by writing him at Route 22, Pawling, New York 12564.

NEW YORK (WHITE PLAINS):

There is no DZ here but it's home for Gene "Fearless" Feeney, D-104, and a man who can always direct you to a DZ for a jump. Write him at Old Orchard Street, White Plains, New York 10604 or call him WH 6-5252 or WH 8-7980 (an answering machine). If anyone can give the straight scoop, Gene can.

NEW YORK (BUFFALO/TONAWANDA):

Two names to contact in this area or westem New York (Lake Erie/Canada portion): Dick Leary, 164 Buffalo Street, Apt. 3, Hamburg, New York 14075; or Ronald G. Martin, 666 Creekside Drive, Tonawanda, New York 14150. One of them can give you the directions to the nearest DZ and possibly get you a leap in on the Canadian side.

NORTH CAROLINA (TRINITY):

The Tar Heel Sport Parachute Center, Inc. is in this area and can be contacted by writing Route 2, Box 218, Trinity, N.C. 27370. Charlie Spillman is club president and could probably be located through the operator.

NORTH CAROLINA (FT. BRAGG AREA):

J. J. Eddington provides the following information on jumping in this area. Pope AFB is right next to Ft. Bragg and offers jumping to military types and, of course, there is Ft. Bragg itself. JJ swears there are jumpers at Bragg who would scrounge a TV tower if they couldn't get a plane and also reports a group called the Golden Knights on the base. You can contact Claude Callahan, 209 Sands, Ft. Bragg 28307 or Tom Carr, 32-F Rhine Road, Ft. Bragg 28307 if you want a base jump group. Contact John Eddington, Box 9283, Pope AFB, No. Carolina 28308 if you are Air Force jumpers. Some of the jumpers in this area journey as far as Spartanburg, So. Carolina for a leap on weekends, however, some of the jumping is at a civilian grass strip called Raeford Airport, about 20 miles from Bragg.

NORTH CAROLINA (GREENSBORO):

The Skyknights of Greensboro jump Sunday afternoons at Thayer Field in Thomasville, North Carolina, Paul Bruder, D-1588, can be contacted by writing P. O. Box 1931, Greensboro, North Carolina 27402. Bascom Craven is also a member of this club and can be contacted by writing 3209 Winchester Drive, Greensboro, No. Carolina 27406. There is great jumping in this area of the country so drop by and sample a lift or two. Facilities include a C-182, pea-gravel target, packing tables, and rigger service. The club has about 25 active members and struggling to become one of the largest in No. Carolina, Doug Lovings, C-3828 and Jim Smith are on the DZ most any weekend, plus Bill Greene (who can be called at 274-3397). USPA membership and logbooks are required; absolutely no streaking and mooning allowed; and one of the best safety records in the state.

NORTH CAROLINA (CHARLOTTE):

Just down the road from the Skyknights, live the Charlotte "Hagalo" Team and the Charlotte Skydivers. Jumping is Wednesday afternoon, Saturday, and Sunday at the Miller Brothers Airport in Mooresville, North Carolina. Both clubs "exchange" meets occasionally and about \$250 worth of trophies are usually up for grabs. Joe Beeson; Warren "The Toad" Bullin; and other jumpers in the area can usually be found at one DZ or the other. The last word I have on Joe is that he is searching for a PC for sale....for a dollar down and a dollar when you catch him....so maybe you can get rid of that RWB with 920 jumps on it. You may run into Bob Thompson here too. Bobisa POPS and can be contacted by writing P. O. Box 662, Mount Holly, North Carolina 28120, Jimmy Davis, D-478, is one of the Hagalos (in case you're curious, ask him); Joe Beiderbecke; Larry Campbell; and Bill Dondanville are also members of the Charlotte club. NORTH DAKOTA (FARGO):

Only one address which may be of assistance. Dave Matson, 524 6th Street So., Moorhead, Minnesota, The Fargo Skydivers jump at Kindred, North Dakota (south of I-94 and 30 miles from Fargo) and the spring jumping is in full swing. You can call Gene Kalscheuer (428-2153, AC 612) at Osseo, Minnesota and I'm sure he can give you all the info you need.

OHIO (SANDUSKY):

This Sandusky Bay SPC is based at Huron Airport on Boss Road (six miles east of Sandusky) and on the shores of Lake Erie. The club was formed in June of 1966 and has a training program that is second to none. It includes a week of instruction, a written exam (which must be passed by a score of at least 90), and a diploma is given to those completing the course. They also have a progressive "public relations" program and speak to civic groups and pass out literature to anyone who is interested in the sport. Aircraft is sometimes a problem (as in any club), but the club may end up with a Twin-Beech and all the jumping they want from it. You can call Don Griffin (president at 626-0166; or Don Snyder (Sec/Treas.) at 626-3151 or 525-2013; or Mickey Seaver (Training and Safety Officer and great Instructor) at 625-4230, The mailing address is Don Griffin, 1609 Larchmont Drive So., Sandusky, Ohio 44870. This DZ is worth going out of your way for....drop by.

OHIO (ALLIANCE):

The Alliance Sport Parachute Club is a fairly large operation with Gary Haupt (president); and jumpers like Don Haynam, D-1656; Art Johanson, D-1134; Bill Arbogast, D-1763; and Ernst Kramer, D-1762 are usually on the DZ. The club has a couple pilots (Jay Farmer and Paul Birtalon) and feel all the jumping doesn't happen West. A lot of it happens right here. USPA membership and logbooks are required and the jumping is year 'round. Some of the best meets in the country are held here and competition gets stiff. There is a pea-gravel target, plenty of wide-open unobstructed spaces (on second thought, that target could be sawdust), and Joe Cooper (the "Cement Bomber") is on hand for most of the jumping activity. You can contact Art Johanson at 2536 So. Union, Alliance, Ohio 44601 or Byron E. Smith, 628 No. Garfield Avenue, Alliance, Ohio 44601. The club address is P. O. Box 626, Alliance, Ohio 44601. OHIO (COLUMBUS):

This is one of the most picturesque DZ's I've seen. It is the Selecte Sport Parachuting Club and the DZ is at Clark's Lakes, Ohio, in the Grove City/Harrisburg area. The facilities leave nothing out....rows of packing tables, restrooms, shaded areas for the summer, pea-gravel target with lots of peas, and local support you wouldn't believe. The operation is in the capable hands of Billy Cook and Ray Dean and is progressing rapidly. With several successful meets under their belts. it's better things ahead in "68. You can contact Billy by writing 31 N. Brinker Avenue, Columbus, Ohio 43204 or Larry R. Harris, 4350 Leesburg N., Columbus, Ohio 43228. This is truly a DZ that you'll enjoy a leap with.

OHIO (DAYTON AREA):

There is some jumping at Bryan, Ohio (a few of the ex-Sky Knights)., but the Dayton area means one drop zone in particular....Xenia, Ohio and the Greene County Sport Parachute Center. Jim West (the most famous "C" license holder in the U.S.) and his partner, Shearer, have provided jumpers from 4 or 5 states around with the best in sport parachuting facilities and organization. The club flys three aircraft (180's and 182's) and has acres of room for anyone who may miss a large pea-gravel target. I took advantage of the wide-open spaces when I jumped there. There are nurseries for the little ones, playrooms (for large and small, a lounge, loft, inside packing or outdoor (if you prefer), a dressing room, and on and on. Add Jim & Lea's hospitality and the DZ rates #1 in the country. This also is home for the "Spoilers" (Neuman, Pugh, Ellis, and Heismann) and anyone from Dr. Thompson (New Zealand) to the Golden Knights (USAPT) may be a visiting VIP. Some of the names I recall who are regular "folks" are: Jean Schultz, Stan Eschenbrenner, Ken Glover, Paul Fayard, and the Lodakis brothers. Charley Joyce (Chicago) also makes the scene, so distance is no problem. You can contact Jim by calling 878-3066 (AC 513) or writing him at 1516 So. Maple, Fairborn, Ohio 45324. OHIO (CINCINNATI):

The Paracenter is here and provides informmation on skydiving to anyone interested. if you are looking for a DZ, call George Rabe at 752-0378 (AC 513), or write P. O. Box 44147, Cincinnati, Ohio 45244,

OHIO (AKRON):

Ray Starnes, 891 Hazel Street, Akron, Ohio 44305 can give you the directions if you're in this area. Ray also has the scoop on the Ohio Parachute Assoc. and can fill you in on the jump activity in Ohio in general, Roy Johnson and Eric Bahor do their jumping somewhere in this area, I believe.

OHIO (TOLEDO):

Dick Schwartz, 210 Crawford, Toledo, Ohio 43612 or Frank Vierling, 1222 Page Street, Toledo, Ohio 43608 will provide directions to the nearest DZ in this area. The club news has not been reported and I'm sorry I can't give you more details.

OKLAHOMA (OKLA, CITY):

The mailing address of the Oklahoma Sport Parachute Association is Oklahoma City but the jumping happens at Stroud, Oklahoma (about 50 miles northeast) on Highway 66. You can write OSPA at 1346 S.W. 74th Street (c/o Cliff Davis, Director), Oklahoma City, Oklahoma 73159. The Sooner Skydivers call Oklahoma City home, but more of the jumping is at Stroud.

OKLAHOMA (STROUD):

The Airport here is operated by Jim McMahon and son and goes all out for jumpers. There is a lounge, outdoor packing, coke & candy machines, and just a couple miles from downtown Stroud. The planes are C-180 with better than average jump pilots (the McMahons usually) and jump rates are as low as you'll find anyplace in the country. The runways are paved and the target is peas and disced ground with nothing in the way of obstacles. The OSU Skydivers from Stillwater, Oklahoma and the Tulsa jumpers all prefer Stroud over any DZ in the area. Jon Moore, Bob Beck, Bob Drake, David Woolsey, Jerry Ellette, and Cliff Davis are regular faces on the DZ and Allen Jones, equipment inspector at the Nationals each year, is sometimes on hand. The club has a C-185, about 20 active members, and offers student instruction. Club Instructors must have at least 100 free-falls prior to jumpmastering students and the course for students is 3 weeks long. The majority of members are USPA but it is not an affiliated club as yet. The student is #1 in this area, so make it a must on your way through Oregon....student or experienced.

OREGON (PORTLAND AREA):

The Portland Parachute Club is here and as reported by Jerry Baumchen last week, the DZ has moved but the club is still strong and getting stronger. PENNSYLVANIA (SHARON/OIL CITY):

TEXAS (LAREDO):



MARK BARON, USPA TREASURER AND NATIONAL DIRECTOR IS DEAD Byline: Editor, DZ-USA

This will be one of the most difficult articles I have ever written. Walking away from the graveside services on 12 April 1968. I still hadn't accepted the fact that a friend to sport parachuting was gone. Mark was a fairly new friend to me but in the short space of a year and a half, he was one of the few Board Members I felt I knew as an individual, not as a member of any organization or group. You felt as comfortable in a hotel room drinking "no ice and tap-water bourbon" as you did when he cut loose on you for something he felt should have been handled differently. A very unique person who will leave a vacancy in USPA that won't be easily filled, if ever. With three or four words, he could settle almost any issue, and throw in a sense of humor to boot. When his Stearman slammed him in and ended it all, if Mark had lived through it, he would probably have had some short, clever comment to cover it all and and went right on as if it never happened. It did happen, however, and to those who knew him (and those who didn't), his shadow will still fall upon the next Board Meeting. Years from now, his influence will still be felt, and that is as it should be. You don't accomplish what Mark did and see a few short years of the future wipe it all out. Mark stood much taller than that in life.

I'm not too gifted with the words, so I will include the following comments by Bill Ottley, National Director, which I believe fits my feelings as well as many others who

knew and respected Mark:

"Mark was sort of an odd guy, and a little different, I guess, from other jumpers, but when you got to know him, he was a wonderful person with a glorious wit; a really sharp sense of humor; and a superb mind. While he was treasurer of USPA(PCA), we never enjoyed better management.... and as you know from coming to Board Meetings, whenever Mark had something to say, everyone listened to him and very few people argued with him. MORE STOLEN GEAR

I am hard put to explain ANY loss of gear, but recently there seems to be a rash of thieves from one end of the U.S. to the other. I hate to say it but too many thefts have been reported and none of the gear is ever recovered. We need someway of helping each other and getting the sticky-fingered little creeps out of the sport. Here is the latest list of equipment taken from Lt. Lee Hector, Fayetteville, North Carolina:

There is a \$50 reward for recovery of all or any part of the equipment. Lee is leaving for Vietnam on the 20th of May, so how about looking around extra careful on this one. If you think you know who may have it, drop a line to Captain Billy Joe Turner, c/o Center for Special Warfare Parachute Club, Ft. Bragg, North Carolina 28307, Capt. 




